Wanting to Make Friends

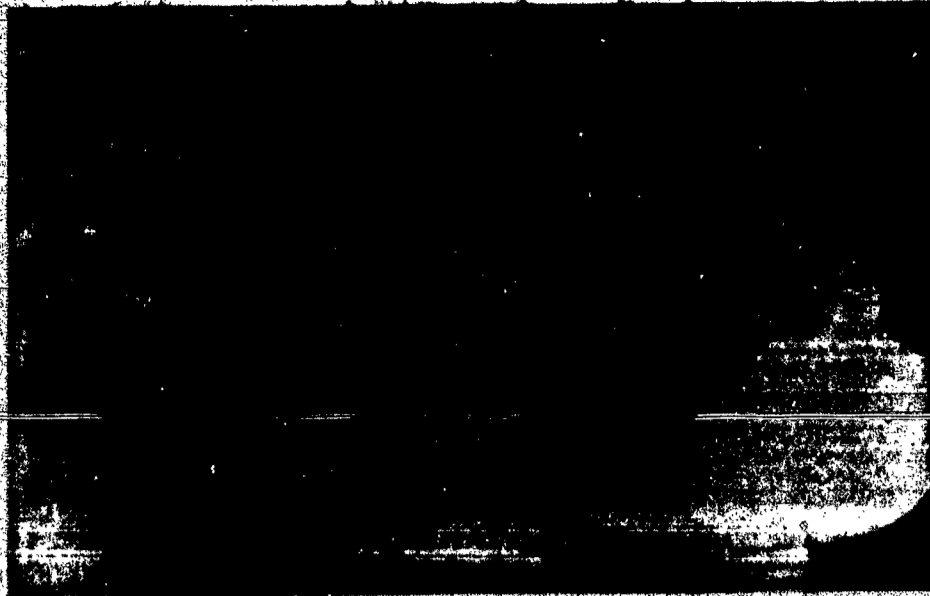
Dear "Friend":

Catholic Theatre Groups Confer At Detroit Meet

Detroit (NC) — A veteran drama critic commented here that the academic world can help give the theater respectability. Some 700 delegates at the 15th National Catholic Theatre Conference convention here (Aug. 24-28) heard keynote speaker Jay Carmody, retired drama critic of the Washington (D.C.) Star, call for production of "plays that are not offensively daring, but brave." "The concept of the theater as diversion must be rejected," Carmody said. "We should act as we respect the theater and make of it a respectable institution. It is a profession." Members of the Rochester Unit of N.C.T.C. in attendance included: the Rt. Rev. George J. Schmitt, Sister M. Evelyn, S.S.J. (a panelist at the convention), Sister M. Cyril, S.S.J., secretary of the Unit, several laymen and student members. Birth Control Ruling Sought

Boston — (RNS) — A small Roman Catholic agency will support two appellants in October when they call on the U.S. Supreme Court to rule against birth control to be unconstitutional. Members of the Catholic Council on Civil Liberties meeting here were informed that the Council's attorney would file an amicus curiae brief before the October term of the U.S. Supreme Court. That brief will support the appeal of Mrs. Estelle T. Griswold, executive director of the Planned Parenthood League of Connecticut, and Dr. C. Lee Buxton, a physician and a staff member of the Yale University Medical School. Connecticut's anti-birth control statute has been contested four times in a 20-year period. In each case it was upheld by the state's courts.

Newspaper Scores Sterilization Plan

Covington, Ky. — (NC) — The Messenger, Covington diocesan newspaper, has attacked a new sterilization plan as an immoral and inadequate solution to the problem of poverty.

"Sterilization is wrong for everyone, not merely for Catholics," the Messenger said in an editorial. "It is wrong because it interferes with human activity, violently and unilaterally. It makes use of a vicious means for achieving social and economic advantages that can and should be otherwise sought after."

The newspaper's attack was aimed at a free sterilization program launched in Berea, Ky., by the Human Betterment Association for Voluntary Sterilization with a \$25,000 gift from New York businessman Jesse Hartman.

BACKERS have described the plan as a means of relieving poverty among the poor in Kentucky mountain regions and as a prototype for a national free sterilization program.

The Messenger said while sterilization is permitted as a side effect of an operation performed to correct a pathological physical condition, such as cancer, its use for the purpose of preventing procreation is immoral.

"Sterilization of innocent individuals, whether voluntary or compulsory, is fundamentally wrong, not only because the Catholic Church says it is wrong but because it directly violates a natural right which is so sacred that it may not be taken away from the individual by the state and may not be voluntarily surrendered to the state by the individual," the newspaper said.

The Messenger noted that "in the mountain areas of Kentucky we definitely have social and economic problems." "Since we have failed to solve these problems," it said, "now we are told to resort to the evils of sterilization. The of 834 Holdridge St., Elmira.
