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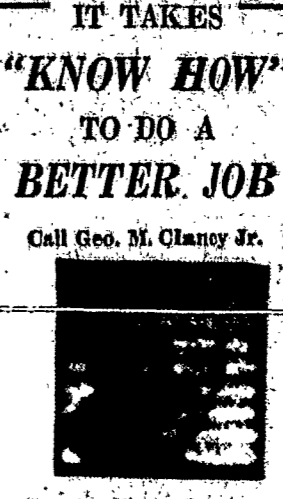

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GOD LOVE YOU!

All expect God to judge first, and most severely the Communists and persecutors of the Church. But first, HE WILL ASK US: How do we really do what He asks of us? We begin with the Church, not with the world; it will not be with the Communists who have denied God, but with us who have professed to love God yet have not served our neighbors. The Apostles called the attention of Our Lord to the beauty of the Temple, glorious in the morning sunrise, but Our Lord said that not a stone of that Temple would be left upon a stone. In the old Testament, God's judgment was "begin with the Temple." St. Peter, referring to the New Testament, warned: "Judgment must begin with the house of God."

The sternest judgment is reserved for those who have the greater responsibility. "Not everyone who says, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the Kingdom of Heaven," said the Lord Himself. He who piled stones upon stones in school, rectory, gymnasium, social center, and convent without giving even one per cent of the million collected to the Christ without a Church in Africa or the sisters living under a least in Kenya? A God pleased with us because we have "successful lives" for \$3 million, 10 million, 20 million and 33 million dollars, if we give not even a sliver of that to our breadwinners and fellow members of Christ's Mystical Body in other parts of the world? May we keep 10,000 cents in one house on the block, while the other houses on the block do not have bread?
To the glory of the Church, one bishop in the United States sees this so clearly that he is giving a percentage of his diocesan revenues to the Holy Father for the propagation of the Faith throughout the world; another priest gave \$18,000—the life savings and most precious wealth he garnered for the Society for the Propagation of the Faith by living poorly; another priest and his brother both sent vacation money. Communists are the lousy who have little but who share that little with the poor of the world.
We pray that each diocese in the United States will set aside a percentage of its annual diocesan budget for God's poor, so that spreading the Faith to the millions in Africa, Asia and elsewhere will not be dependent upon a collection once or twice a year. We pray that the laity, in making donations for the Church in the United States, will also donate a percentage of them to the Holy Father. If judgment begins with the Church, as it does, then let it not be with the Church in the United States. It was a paragon who said that "charity does not begin at home." It begins with the entire Mystical Body of Christ throughout the world.
