

Reports From Hong Kong By Missionary, Tourist

Father James O'Halloran, whose Maryknoll Mission at Kwun Tong, Kowloon, Hong Kong was hit by typhoon "Iida" in early August, this week sent his personal observations on the storm which washed a huge section of mountain down upon the "blocks" of eight tenement houses making up the Mission.

Describing the initial shock, he writes: "Mud was everywhere and three feet deep all over, and people were hustling and shouting and trying to get out from under it just as you do after a big drifting snow storm. Only mud is a bit heavier and much more difficult to handle."

"Our people bore up well under this burden," Father O'Halloran continues. "They are used to moving. All of them are refugees from the mainland and have been on the move so much since they fled Red China that moving for them is like going on a trip or a picnic as you do after a big drifting snow storm. Only mud is a bit heavier and much more difficult to handle."

Commenting on the "hurricane" the Maryknoll missionaries say they hope to have the return far by Advent, but the many dialects pose a real difficulty.

FATHER O'HALLORAN is proud of his Mission which celebrated its fifth anniversary in June. Beginning with two priests and forty-seven Christians, it has grown to four priests, a brother, four sisters and 8,750 Catholics. The Rochester priest will be teaching literature and composition this year in the Mission Middle School.

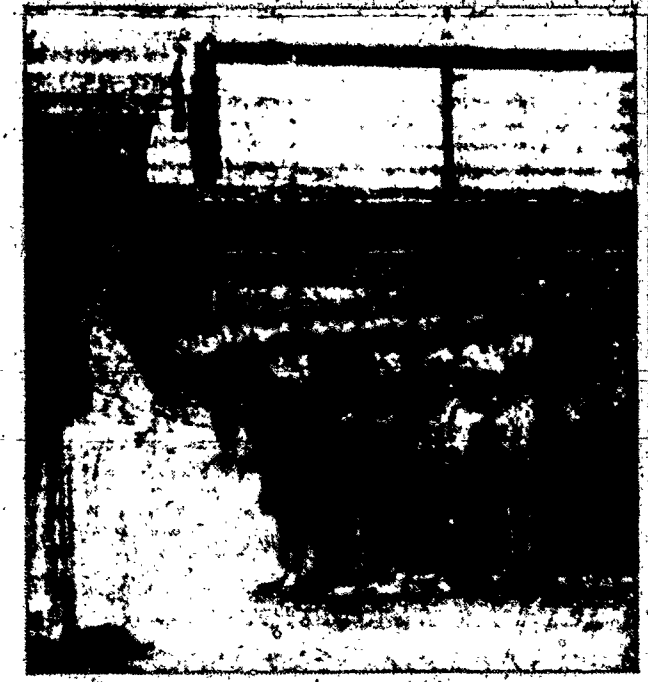


'Open House' at The Cathedral

Father O'Halloran commented on the number of Rochester tourists he had met in Hong Kong: "The tourist business is one of the main enterprises of the colony," he said, "and it is too bad that all the tourists can't include a trip through resettlement areas so the visitors can see what has been done when government and private organizations and people themselves haven't been afraid to work together."

DOLORES FISCHER of 11 Kings Lane, Irondequoit, is one of those Rochester tourists. She describes her brief visit with the missionary at Hong Kong:

"Arriving in Hong Kong, we contacted Father O'Halloran by phone and he generously offered to show us around. He took us first to a floating restaurant for a typical Chinese meal, complete with chopsticks. To get there he had to bargain in Chinese (which he speaks quite fluently) with a small Chinese girl and her mother. They took us over to the restaurant."

"The following morning," she continues, "Father took us to some of the Maryknoll Missions. Each has its own dispensary. One parish alone has 40,000 people. Their conditions are unbelievable. The new tenement buildings are alleviating the people's suffering. The changes resulting are more and more to their credit and hope."

"Catholicism they also eye warily. Most Chinese, particularly the older generations, are extremely superstitious. Father said never in his experience has he seen more superstitions in the Chinese than here. The Chinese are more attracted by the repellent of rotary heads and the avenues than by the teachings of Catholicism."

"But Father O'Halloran," Miss Fischer concludes, "with the other priests, brothers and sisters, are gradually bringing Christ into their lives. The children are the future, and this being true, the future of the Catholic Church in Hong Kong looks very promising."

Lawyers' Red Mass Set Tuesday, September 15

Inaugurated here in 1945 by Bishop Kearney, the impressive and colorful ceremony of the Red Mass has been carried out each year since.

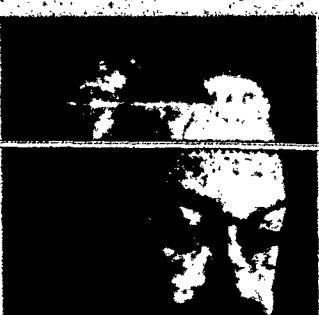
The Red Mass takes its name in part from the red vestments worn by the ministers of the Mass and from the academic splendor which marked the Mass in medieval days. In ancient times, the Red Mass was attended by civil judges in brilliant robes and university doctors in scarlet gowns.

Dedication Ceremonies Slated At Mt. Saviour

The people of the Elmira and Corning area are invited to join the Benedictine Monks of Mount Saviour Monastery in a celebration of the completion and dedication of two new Monastery buildings during the weekend of Sept. 12-14.

This dedication represents the culmination of 13 years of work first begun in 1951 when Bishop Kearney welcomed the original group of Benedictines to Mount Saviour.

Permanent housing for the community of monks, now numbering 35, is completed with sleeping quarters, library, study and classroom in the Northwest building. Also to be dedicated is the Northeast building which includes refectory, kitchen, laundry, infirmary, porter's lodge and parlors. Both buildings are done in an unusual architecture—an expression of the ancient monastic life translated into modern framework.

An open house weekend has been planned to give area residents an opportunity to visit the Monastery.

On Saturday, Sept. 12, Sisters of the Rochester, Buffalo, Syracuse and Scranton dioceses have been invited to participate at an Eastern rite Mass, sung in English by the Monks, and celebrated by the Rev. Wladimir Pylpuec, pastor of Holy Trinity Church of St. Clair, Pa. A buffet luncheon will be served and Sisters will be conducted on tours of the buildings by members of the Monastery.

Sunday, Sept. 13, will be open house to the general public. Tours of the newly finished buildings will be the main event of the day. The ceremonies will start with a High Mass at 11 a.m. celebrated by Rev. Damasus Winzen, prior of Mt. Saviour Monastery. Refreshments will be available during the day and activities will conclude with Vespers and Benediction at 5 p.m.

On Monday, Sept. 14 at 4 p.m. Bishop Kearney of Rochester will conduct an Episcopal Blessing of the new buildings. This will be in the form of appropriate prayers chanted in blessing of all the major rooms of the new buildings. In the Chapel, Benediction will be sung and a multi-composed by Professor Maximilian Albrecht, of Mt. Saviour, to the text of "This is the house of the Lord" will be sung by the Monks.

Following Wednesday's Mass, he will describe his work with Catholics, a shrinking minority in fifteen year old Israel.

HIS DIOCESE spans the area where the world's Saviour spent nearly thirty years of His life, where He worked many of His miracles and where He preached many of His doctrines.

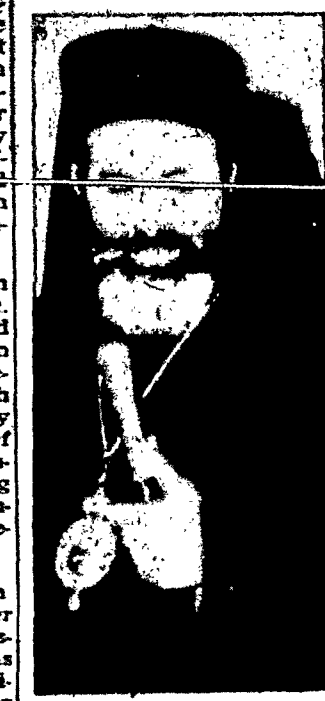
Father James Sarkis, pastor of St. Nicholas, invites the public to the Archbishop's Mass and talk.
