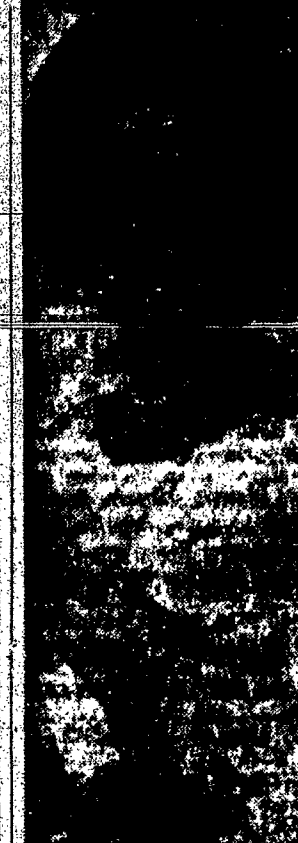
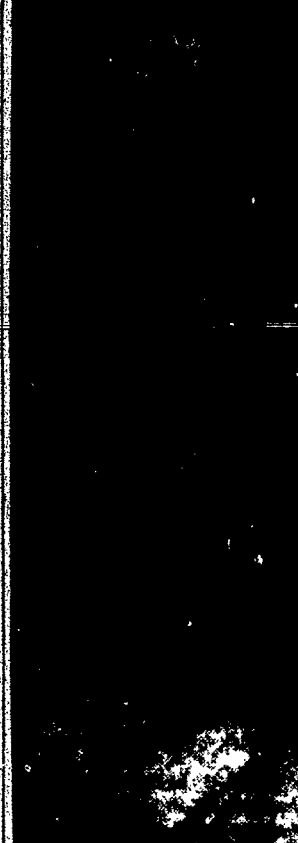
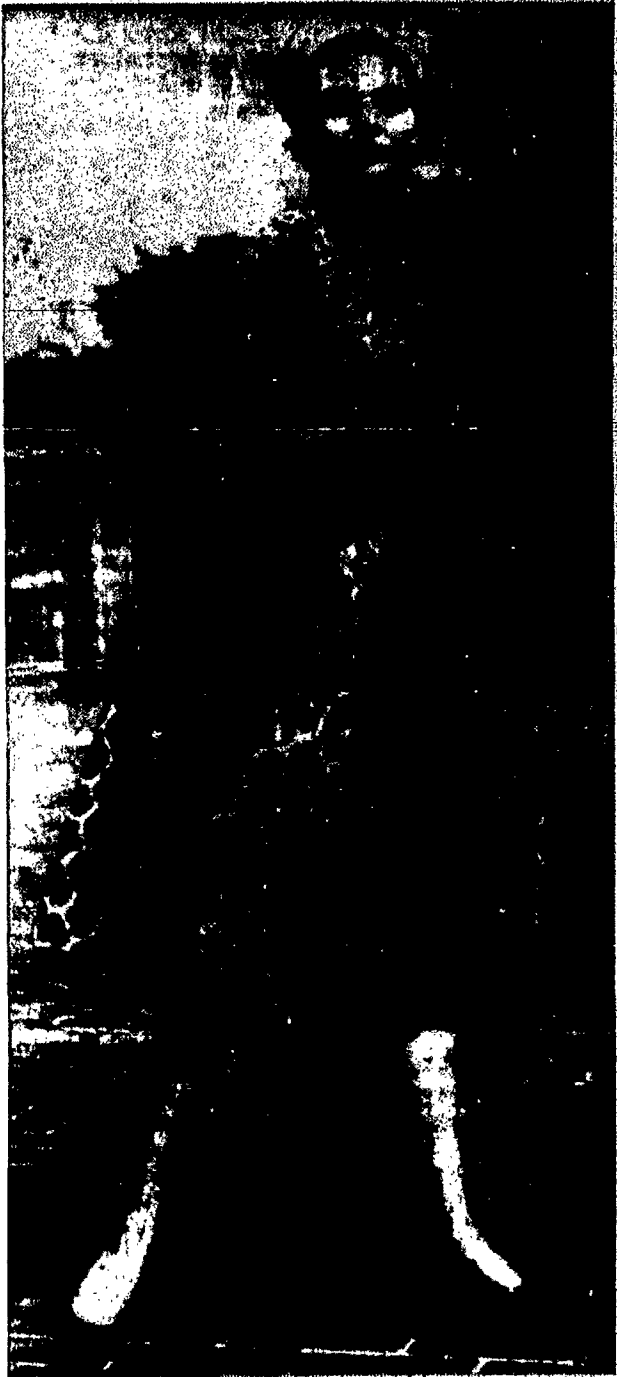


# Area Couples Say Wedding Vows

Fur goes to the Fair, the World's Fair, courtesy of Bernard Held of Rochester and the Genesee Trappers Association on Ontario Day, September 23rd. What's more, seven attractive young ladies from this area, high school and college students will model the furs in the Fashion Wing of the New York Pavilion. There will be complete showings at 11:30 a.m., 3:30 and 5:30 p.m. with this columnist as fashion director and commentator.

For the benefit of area residents who may not make it to the World's Fair on Ontario Day, a special preview will be presented this Friday night (Sept. 11th) at 8:30 in the auditorium of the Elementary School in Canandaigua, New York. Whether you come to this preview Friday or the New York presentation twelve days later, you'll see almost every conceivable fur in the animal kingdom.

Featured furs include dyed broadtail lamb, sable cut mink, Jaguar (as pictured), muskrat, even squirrel masquerading as sable. This latter trick has been tried before, and recently, but never as successfully. Styles to be modeled include everything from little doll jackets to full length sable coats. Colors run the gamut from jet black to almost white with wonderful pastels in between: rose, beige, fawn, etc.

Despite the lavish treatment, the voluminous folds of many styles furs have a weightless description. And they are so handsomely styled that they have an appeal even to the very young. A far cry from former days when furs were fashioned into coats for comfort and not for style! Now they are lavish, luxurious, the ultimate in loveliness.

Vicki Worder of Honeoye, a sophomore at Ithaca, will wear a Jaguar handled as deftly as a fabric with the slight A-line and lavished with natural ranch mink for an elegant accent trim. Another fur of her choice is a "Little doll" jacket of dyed black mink with a ring collar and below-elbow sleeves. Joy Dodswelt of Lima, looks stunning in the almost full length white mink coat combined with matching leather.

Diane Batzel, freshman at Morrisville, Agricultural College wears very well a mink clutch cape, a walking length coat of mink trimmed Persian and a "freckled Fur", leopard cat coat with a ranch mink trim. Monika Fortner, senior at Canandaigua, wears with great style a gorgeous Russian sable cape and an orsiter white sheared beaver coat square collared in morning light mink.
