

Lawyers' Red Mass Set Tuesday, September 15

Tuesday, Sept. 15 is the date for this year's Lawyers' Red Mass to be celebrated by Bishop Kearney at 9 a.m. in St. Joseph's Church, Supreme Court Justice Daniel J. O'Mara said today.

Bishop Kearney will be the speaker. Representatives of civic and fraternal groups will join with judges, attorneys and civic leaders at the Mass this year.

Delegations will attend from Rochester Chamber of Commerce, Damascus Temple, American Legion, Moose Temple, Rochester Police Bureau, Monroe County Sheriff's Department and Rochester Fire Bureau.

Inaugurated here in 1945 by Bishop Kearney, the impressive and colorful ceremony of the Red Mass has been carried out each year since.

The Red Mass takes its name in part from the red vestments worn by the ministers of the Mass and from the academic splendor which marked the Mass in medieval days. In ancient times, the Red Mass was attended by civil judges in brilliant robes and university doctors in scarlet gowns.

Dedication Ceremonies Slated At Mt. Saviour

The people of the Elmira and Corning area are invited to join the Benedictine Monks of Mount Saviour Monastery in a celebration of the completion and dedication of two new Monastery buildings during the weekend of Sept. 12-14.

Program To Aid Clinic

Hornell—Hornell and area women are forming the nucleus for a unique charity project which will be expanded this fall throughout the Diocese of Rochester.

The project, called the "Madonna Helpers" has been organized to assist mothers and infants in drastically underprivileged sections of the world.

Miss Josephine Fitzgerald of Hornell, national chairman of the Foreign Relief Committee of the National Council of Catholic Women, is heading the drive.

So far, \$200 has been collected in Hornell and the immediate area for a clinic near Caracas, Venezuela where there are thousands living in squalid shacks in what is described as "rightful squalor."

Miss Fitzgerald said the amount raised in Hornell was by volunteer assistance. There were no administrative costs involved. She hopes to use the same method in other parishes throughout the diocese.

A definite clinic has been selected near Caracas for aid from the Catholic women in Hornell and other sections of the diocese. It is the "Casa Post-Natal" and is staffed by the Daughters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul.

The clinic's foremost purpose are the rehabilitation of young unwed mothers who have no place to go and the care of their babies and other abandoned children. Cases are admitted according to need, regardless of creed or color.

Mother Superior Gabrielle, who heads the staff of eight Sisters of Charity says: "The new mothers are taught how to take care of their babies how to feed and bath them, and above all, to love them. Nothing else is expected of them for the first 21 days.
