

Lawyers' Red Mass Set Tuesday, September 15

Tuesday, Sept. 15 is the date for this year's Lawyers' Red Mass to be celebrated by Bishop Kearney at 9 a.m. in St. Joseph's Church, Supreme Court Justice Daniel J. O'Mara said today.

Bishop Kearney will be the speaker. Representatives of civic and fraternal groups will join with judges, attorneys and civic leaders at the Mass this year.

Delegations will attend from Rochester Chamber of Commerce, Damascus Temple, American Legion, Moose Temple, Rochester Police Bureau, Monroe County Sheriff's Department and Rochester Fire Bureau.

Inaugurated here in 1945 by Bishop Kearney, the impressive and colorful ceremony of the Red Mass has been carried out each year since.

The Red Mass takes its name in part from the red vestments worn by the ministers of the Mass and from the academic splendor which marked the Mass in medieval days. In ancient times, the Red Mass was attended by civil judges in brilliant robes and university doctors in scarlet gowns.

Justice O'Mara who is chairman of the general committee announced committees for the 1934 Mass.

Dedication Ceremonies Slated At Mt. Saviour

The people of the Elmira and Corning area are invited to join the Benedictine Monks of Mount Saviour Monastery in a celebration of the completion and dedication of two new monastery buildings during the weekend of Sept. 12-14.

This dedication represents the culmination of 13 years of work first begun in 1921 when Bishop Kearney welcomed the original group of Benedictines to Mount Saviour.

Permanent housing for the community of monks, now numbering 35, is completed with a dining room, library, study and classroom in the Northwest building. Also to be dedicated is the Northeast building which includes refectory, kitchen, laundry, infirmary, porter's lodge and parlor. Both buildings are done in an unusual architectural style—an expression of the monastic life translated into modern framework.

An open house weekend has been planned to give area residents an opportunity to visit the Monastery.

On Saturday, Sept. 12, Sisters of the Rochester, Buffalo, Syracuse and Scranton dioceses have been invited to participate at an Eastern rite Mass, sung in English by the monks, and celebrated by the Rev. Wladimir Pypke, pastor of Holy Trinity Church of St. Clair, Pa. A luncheon will be served and Benediction at 8 p.m.

On Monday, Sept. 14 at 4 p.m. Bishop Kearney of Rochester will conduct an Episcopal Blessing of the new buildings. This will be in the form of appropriate prayers chanted in blessing of all the major rooms of the new buildings. In the Chapel, Benediction will be sung and a motet composed by Professor Maximilian Albrecht, of Mt. Saviour to the text: "This is the house of the Lord" will be sung by the Monastery choir. Friends and benefactors of the Monastery, local Catholic clergy, clergy of other denominations, Jewish faiths have been invited to participate at these ceremonies.

Program To Aid Clinic

Hornell—Hornell and area women are forming the nucleus for a unique charity project which will be expanded this fall throughout the Diocese of Rochester.

The project, called the "Madonna Helpers" has been organized to assist mothers and infants in drastically underprivileged sections of the world.

Miss Josephine Fitzgerald of Hornell, national chairman of the Foreign Relief Committee of the National Council of Catholic Women, is heading the drive.

So far, \$200 has been collected in Hornell and the immediate area for a clinic near Caracas, Venezuela where there are thousands living in squalid shacks in what is described as "frightful squalor."

The clinic's foremost purpose is the rehabilitation of young unwed mothers who have no place to go and the care of their babies and other abandoned children. Cases are admitted according to need, regardless of creed or color.

Mother Superior Gabrielle, who heads the staff of eight Sisters of Charity says: "The new mothers are taught how to take care of their babies how to feed and bath them, and above all, to love them. Nothing else is expected of them for the first 21 days.

"The girls then begin to learn how to do something useful for themselves to make their way in the world. They are taught how to iron, sew and cook."

"After she gets on her feet every girl gets paid for her work at the Casa. A third of her salary helps pay the running expenses of the home since it is not supported by any established group.

"When a girl has learned a skill, the Casa makes arrangements for her hiring by some interested family. The one regulation that is strictly adhered to is that the family must be willing to accept both mother and child."

The Elmira Catholic High School-Notre Dame Alumni Association serves as a connecting link with the school for two lay teachers and a resident chaplain, Rev. Joseph F. Hogan, now pastor of St. Vincent de Paul Church, Corning.

The first graduating class of 1935 numbered 45 students and boasted five scholarship winners; the class of 1934 numbered 166 students, including 27 scholarship winners. A total of 111 scholarships have been awarded to Notre Dame students during the nine years the school has been in operation.

NOTRE DAME is proud of the fact that a number of 1934 graduates have gone into professions where they can be of service to their faith, their fellow man and their country. Twenty-two religious women, twenty-four seminarians, one religious brother and one minister are Notre Dame alumni. Sixty-two teachers, baby nurses, a number of social workers and medical students, in addition to two peace corps workers are also numbered among the graduates.

Students currently pursuing their education abroad include Thomas McDonald '39, studying for the priesthood at the North American College in Rome, and Karen McWilliams '33, Trinity College, Washington, D.C., who will spend her sophomore year at the University of Madrid, Spain.

Dennis Smith '33, former CSBC president, is representing Elmira and Notre Dame at the Air Force Academy, and David Ford '33, former Student Council president, is beginning at West Point this term.

On the athletic scene, Patrick Lutz '30, recently signed with the Baltimore Orioles, and is also the recipient of a two-year fellowship in chemistry at Syracuse University.

Approximately 65 percent of each graduating class at Notre Dame goes on for some form of higher education, in addition to those who enroll in business and nursing schools.

Four Notre Dame graduates have died during the nine years: James Crowe '33, William Milliken '33, Joseph Dwyer '32, and Thomas Delaney '33. Three Notre Dames died as students: Kay Frost (Class of '30), Virginia...
