

## Resident Students Up At Nazareth College

More than 300 freshmen — 55 per cent of them resident students — will register Sunday and Monday (Sept. 13 and 14) for the 1954-55 Nazareth College year.

Resident students will report on campus Sunday while freshman day students will register the following day. This year marks the first time that resident students have exceeded day students at the college.

More than 800 lay students, including 40 sophomores and junior transfers, will be enrolled in the four classes. Approximately half of the total enrollment will reside on campus.

The substantially higher number of resident students on campus will be accommodated in part by the opening of two dormitory wings in the new Kearney Hall Building. Only one wing was available last year.

To take care of the steadily increasing registration, three new Ph. Ds have been added to the Nazareth faculty: the Rev. James E. Laughery, O.P., former director of the Catholic University Speech Clinic, who will assist in the Speech Department; Sister Joan Margaret, who will teach Theology; and Miss Hermine Plaisir, who will join the Foreign Language Department. Father Laughery received his Ph.D. from the University of Michigan, Sister Joan Margaret from St. Mary's College in Indiana and Miss Plaisir from the University of Madrid.

Other faculty additions are: Miss Marina deGuzman (Business Department), Albin Gruber and Sister M. Sophia (English), Mrs. Elizabeth Flaherty (Biology), Mrs. Carole Stroud and Sister M. Theodore (Mathematics), and Miss Sheila Wells (Art). Additions to the administrative staff are Miss Mary Ann, who will work in the Registrar's Office, and Sister M. Honor.

## Bishop Scores Court Stand On Obscenity

Steubenville — (NC) — Bishop John King Muccio of Steubenville, Ohio, has accused the U.S. Supreme Court of "confusion, contradiction and a certain irresponsibility" in its latest actions on obscenity and censorship.

Bishop Muccio said in a statement that the justices of the high court are "utterly confused about the nature and meaning of the word pornography" and are making the nation suffer for their confusion.

"While they experiment in doubt and indecision," he said, "they turn loose upon this country a flood of fifth and sixth grade material which the majority of our citizens is convinced will ruin the moral fibre of our nation."

The Supreme Court's latest rulings on obscenity and censorship came last June 22 when it reversed an Ohio ban on the movie "The Lovers" and a Kansas ban on a number of paperback books. The same day the court by a summary action reversed Florida court rulings against the novel "Tropic of Cancer."

The justices wrote a large number of conflicting opinions in the Ohio and Kansas cases in which they showed themselves sharply divided on the basic issues of what constitutes obscenity and what can be done about it.

New York — (NC) — Two hundred priests are urgently needed to fill vacancies in the Army, Air Force, and Navy chaplains corps, Cardinal Spellman, Military Vicar of the U.S. armed forces, said here.

The Cardinal said chaplain vacancies exist in all three services but particularly in the Army. He said he had received a letter from the Chief of Army Chaplains stating that more than 104,000 Catholic families of Army personnel do not have a Catholic chaplain to care for their spiritual needs.
