Catechist Volunteer At Industry

About forty young Catholic lay people gathered at the Catholic Rectory at the State Agricultural and Industrial School at Industry on Sunday, Sept. 13, to formulate plans for the teaching of religion to the teen-age delinquent boys at the school. Father John P. Norris, Catholic chaplain, was their host and Robert Sollyan, assistant superintendent of the school, gave a short briefing of the aims and objectives of the program. The LAY CATECHISTS are recruited from the St. Thomas More Club, the Adult Sodality of Rochester, and the Rochester Catholic Adult Society. These young people are volunteering to visit Industry every other Friday evening, beginning Sept. 18 to instruct youngsters, many of whom are delinquent in their knowledge and practice of the Catholic Faith. After a tour of the grounds and Benediction at the Catholic chapel and picnic supper at the rectory, the volunteer teachers were given an opportunity to ask pertinent questions of Sullivan about the type of boy at Industry and the training program offered there. Father Norris then outlined plans for the catechetical year, assigning two teachers to each of the twenty-one cottage units at the school and discussed the text to be used. An organizational committee of the three groups, consisting of Kerry McDonald, Blanche Erbland and other members, was appointed for the coming year.

Freshman Grants Total \$16,000 At Fisher College

Admissions scholarships totaling \$16,000 have been awarded to 27 incoming freshmen at St. John Fisher College. It was announced today by Rev. Joseph B. Dorsey, C.S.B., dean of the college.
