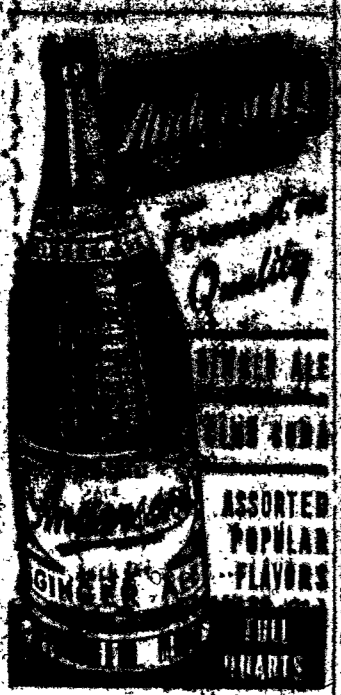


Scouts' Retreat Set At Mission

New Year Sees Innovations At McQuaid

Last week McQuaid Jesuit High School began its second decade as its new principal, Rev. Robert Keck, S.J., welcomed the class of 1965, 300 members strong.

For the first time freshmen orientation was placed in the hands of upperclassmen. Under the supervision of its moderator, Rev. John St. George, S.J., and its president, Michael Jarry, the Student Council organized a program designed to impart to the new freshmen the spirit of McQuaid in its academic, athletic and spiritual aspects. Besides explaining the purpose of various subjects and extra-curricular activities, these upperclassmen, called "brothers," assisted the freshmen in obtaining books and lockers and in finding their way around the unfamiliar school schedule. The two day orientation program successfully concluded with a picnic lunch and field day.

Another innovation this year is the increase in student "traffic" in the past students remained in the same room throughout the day and the teachers would come to them. Under a new system the teacher of a particular subject remains in a permanent classroom while the students move about. This enables the teacher to use all classroom board space for permanent displays in his own subject, an impossibility when six or seven different subjects are taught in one classroom.

Biology, Anthropology and Spanish have also been added to the curriculum for the first time this year. This is in line with McQuaid's effort to give the student as varied a background as possible in his education and the humanities in preparation for future college work.

As the 1964-1965 academic year begins, 770 boys are enrolled in McQuaid's three track college preparatory program. In the first ten years of its existence, McQuaid has graduated some 1200 students, more than ninety per cent of which have gone on to college.

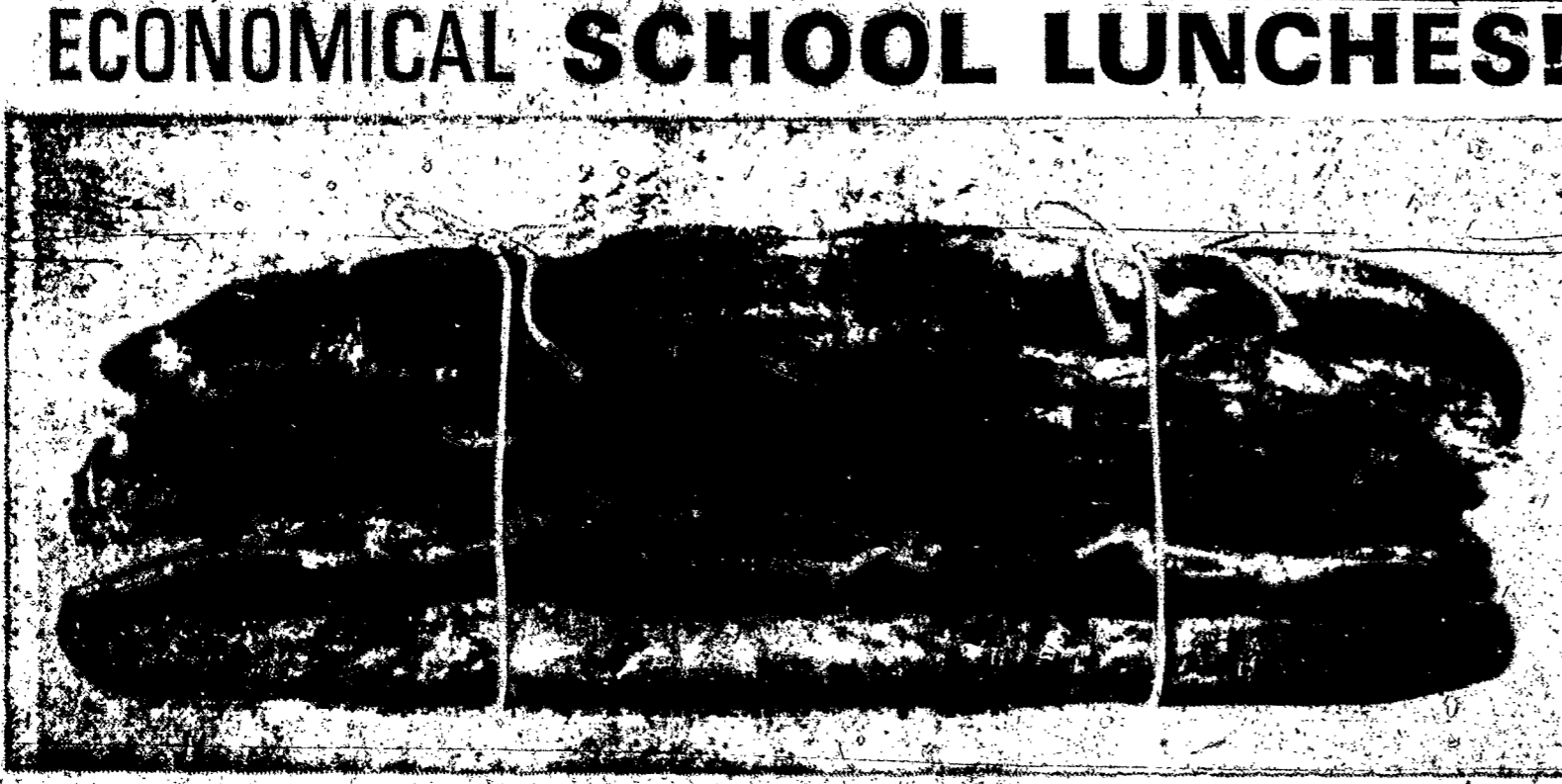
