

Kickoff Rally Scheduled For New Retreat Center

More than 100 special gifts where four Redemptorist Fathers have conducted closed retreats for the last 14 years.

The new Notre Dame Retreat Center will provide for 150 individual retreatants, 50 per cent more than the Alexander Street quarters. To be constructed on a 55-acre hilltop in West Lake Road, five miles south of Canandaigua, it will be nearer the geographic center of the Diocese.

Scheduled for completion late next year, the new structure will replace present facilities at the Notre Dame Retreat House, 246 Alexander St., Rochester.

Last year 16,000 total attendance of more than 400,000 in its athletic and recreational activities. Many memberships go to underprivileged boys and girls, providing access to facilities and activities.

Apalachin Parish Plans New Church, Rectory, Hall

Apalachin — A new church, rectory and a parish hall will be built on 18 acres of Church property on Pennsylvania Avenue in Apalachin, Rev. Valentine A. Jankowski, pastor of St. Margaret Mary's Church announced a few days ago.

At the same time, Father Jankowski said a campaign to raise \$50,000 to help finance the construction of these buildings will be conducted by the men of the parish under the leadership of John O'Donnell and Frederick Brown, Co-General Chairmen.

THE PROPOSED new church building will be a modern, rectangular design of masonry and laminated wood timber framing, approximately 100 x 60 feet. The nave will seat 400 parishioners. There will be large areas of acoustically treated wood for warmth and the floors will be terrazzo. Provisions for air-conditioning are included and a modern public address system will be installed. Ample parking space will be provided.

A wing connecting the church with the rectory will house the parish administrative offices.

The rectory building will be a two story matching design also of masonry and laminated wood. Plans include 3 bedrooms, a guest room, housekeeper's quarters, kitchen, dining room and a living room.

The parish hall will also be matching design of masonry and laminated wood. It will be a one story construction, 50 feet wide and 85 feet in length with a seating capacity of 400. A basketball court with show-

ers and locker rooms are included. The kitchen will open immediately into the parish hall and storage space will be provided.

A centrally located fired boiler will provide heat for the three buildings.

Foley Associates, Inc. of Rochester, a Catholic Fund Raising Organization, assisted in the direction of the campaign.
