

Week Of Activities Set For Nursing Students

A full week was planned for the sixty-four young women who entered St. Joseph's Hospital School of Nursing, Elmira Sunday afternoon, Sept. 13. After registration, assignment to rooms and dinner, the freshmen met formally with Sister Marie Michael, Director of Nursing for a brief orientation. The remainder of the evening was spent getting acquainted, unpacking, and settling with the able assistance of their "Big Sisters," members of the Junior Class.

On Monday, and continuing throughout the week, the freshmen began their formal orientation to the life which will be theirs for the next three years. Included in the orientation were tours of the hospital and nurses' residences, pre-tests in various educational areas, classes in the use of the library, the art of study guidance and liturgical singing; and discussions explaining the various school and hospital activities and organizations.

Formal classes begin on Friday, Sept. 18. This year, for the first time, the students will attend Elmira College for classes in anatomy and physiology, general chemistry and microbiology.

Social activities include a Social Hour for faculty and students on Monday afternoon in the social room of the Nurses' Residence, a Big and Little Sister Party, a tour of Elmira on Wednesday and a meeting of the "Newcomer" party and more sponsored by the Student Government Association on Thursday.

A Mass was planned on Thursday with the entire student body and faculty in attendance. This was to be followed by a student-faculty luncheon in the student dining room.

Sister Marie Michael, Director of Nursing, announces the appointment of Mrs. Prudence Gerberg to the faculty as instructor in Psychology. Mrs. Gerberg is a graduate of Western Reserve University and has attended Colgate University, the University of Kentucky and Hartwick College. She serves as a school psychologist in the Spencer-Candor-Van Ertens school district and is a member of the American Psychological Association.

Miss Johanna Yahner will join the faculty as an instructor in Nursing. Miss Yahner received her B.S. in Nursing from Villanova University and has had experience at Bryn Mawr Hospital and the Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania.

Aquinas vs Corning in Opener

Aquinas Institute will unveil its 1964 little Irish football team Friday night, Sept. 18, at Memorial Stadium when it meets Corning's East High School.

Last year the Irish defeated an inexperienced East High eleven, 40-14 in Corning.

Coach Joe Repko, Aquinas mentor, says the Little Irish has the potential to become a strong aggregation. Right now Repko is pleased with the way his squad is going about the business of preparing for another fall of the football year. This is the ninth year of bossing the Irish for Repko, a one-time tackle for the Pittsburgh Steelers and the Los Angeles Rams.

Analyzing his ball club position by position, the coach was optimistic.

REPKO PLANS to try Bruce Scepanski in the quarterback slot. Scepanski, a member of last year's squad, has meager playing experience. Also a possibility is John Dinolfo, who saw limited varsity action last season and Craig Englert, up from last season's Jayvee squad. The QB spot is a tough one to fill on Repko's team, and lacking any player who sparkles in this position, it is somewhat of a question mark.

"We'll alternate quarterbacks," Repko said. "Right now there's not much difference among them. If one comes through we'll stick with him."

The rest of the backfield shaped up as Pat Dinicola, a junior, who has shown flashes of brilliance, at right halfback; Jim Catone, a returning letterman, probably will start at left half. The fullback duties figure to be split between senior Randy Block and junior Don Cannioto. Both Block and Cannioto are speed merchants.

Repko is also high on Jim Dally, Gary Mulligan and Greg Manley, who may earn a starting backfield spot before the season's over.

"The overall attitude of the team is healthy," Repko noted. "The problem will be staying up for games and not worrying about injuries," he said.

Repko's line looks to be in very good shape, with plenty of depth. Dick Schausel, an experienced varsity hand with above average ability, will start at on end. Junior Jim Poppe will probably hold down the other end spot. Gary Pelcher, also a junior, may get a shot at end duty also.

Kickoff for Friday night's game against Corning is set for 7:30 p.m. The Aquinas Marching Band will lead a parade of students from the Dewey Avenue Campus to the Aquinas stadium prior to game time. Tickets are available from Aquinas students or at the box office prior to the game.

Apalachin Parish Plans New Church, Rectory, Hall

Apalachin — A new church, rectory and a parish hall will be built on 16 acres of Church property on Pennsylvania Avenue in Apalachin, Rev. Valentine A. Jankowski, pastor of St. Margaret Mary's Church announced a few days ago.

At the same time, Father Jankowiak said a campaign to raise \$60,000 to help finance the construction of these buildings will be conducted by the men of the parish under the leadership of John O'Donnell and Frederick Brown, Co-General Chairmen.

THE PROPOSED new church building will be a modern, rectangular design of masonry and laminated wood timber framing, approximately 100 x 60 feet. The nave will seat 400 parishioners. There will be large areas of acoustically treated wood for warmth and the floors will be terrazzo. Provisions for air-conditioning are included and a modern public address system will be installed. Ample parking space will be provided.

A wing connecting the church with the rectory will house the parish administrative offices.

The rectory building will be a two story matching design also of masonry and laminated wood. Plans include 3 bedrooms, a guest room, housekeeper's quarters, kitchen, dining room and a living room.

The parish hall will also be a matching design of masonry and laminated wood. It will be a one story construction, 50 feet wide and 85 feet in length with a seating capacity of 400. A basketball court with showers and locker rooms are included. The kitchen will open immediately into the parish hall and storage space will be provided.


A centrally located fired boiler will provide heat for the three buildings.
