The kick-off is scheduled for 8 p.m. this Saturday evening, Sept. 26, in the Chapel Hall, marking initiation of the solicitation phase in the drive to build a new church and rectory.

Members of the 125-man advance solicitation committee will make a limited number of calls on fellow-parishioners between the hours of 2 and 4 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 27, under the leadership of William J. Lally, parish chairman.

Remaining campaign events include the pep rally Oct. 1, general committee kick-off, Oct. 2 and the parish-wide general solicitation, Sunday, Oct. 4, between the hours of 2 and 4 p.m. Contingent on the successful outcome of the current campaign, ground will be broken in the spring for a new church seating more than 1000, to be built on a site adjoining present parish buildings at the intersection of Mt. Read Boulevard and Latta Road. Plans call for inclusion of a social hall on the lower level of the church building as well as a new rectory adjacent to the primary structure.

Sister Formation Group Served By McAuley Dean

Sister Mary de Pazzi of the Rochester Sisters of Mercy, is a member of the planning committee of the Sister Formation Conference, Eastern Region, which will go to New York for a two-day conference, Oct. 25 and 26.

As chairman of the Socio-Religious Committee, one of six committees preparing for the biennial conference, Sister de Pazzi is charged with the responsibility of investigating the future role and training of the sisters in the social apostolate. The theme of the sister conference to be held in February, 1966, is the study of factors of change needed to meet the requirements in the future training of sisters.

One hundred eighty religious communities will be represented at the conference by mothers, general, mistress, deans, and supervisors.

MOTHER MARY Brien, Mother General of the Rochester Sisters of Mercy and president of Catharine McAuley College, will also attend the planning sessions. She has accompanied Sister Mary de Pazzi in an advisory capacity in two previous sister conferences, one in New York, another in Clifton, N.J.

Representatives of 47 Catholic colleges from 13 states, the District of Columbia, and Canada will participate in the Rochester Area Catholic College Information Program to be held jointly on the St. John Fisher College and Nazareth College campuses Sunday, Sept. 27, at 7:30 p.m.

Junior and senior students from all area and Rochester Diocesan High Schools and their parents have been invited to attend the program. According to Ronald E. Frowd, Director of Admissions at St. John Fisher College, between 3,000 and 4,000 students and their parents are expected to be present.

Representatives of the participating colleges will furnish pertinent information concerning their institutions to the future college enrollees.

Delegates from men's and co-educational colleges will be located on the Fisher Campus. Nazareth will be open to delegates from women's colleges.

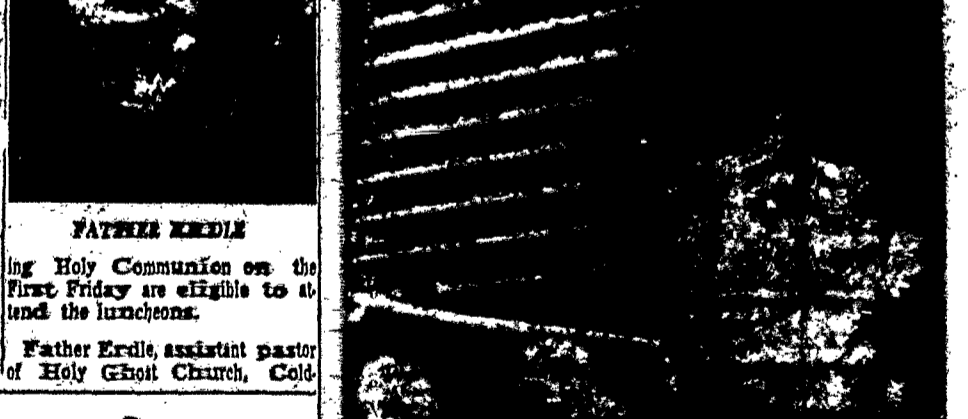
Spiritual Aid To Deaf, Friday Speaker's Topic

Bishop Lauds Mary Devotion

Devotion to the Blessed Mother will not be lessened nor appeals for Her intercession be abandoned as a result of reports from the Vatican Council, Bishop Kearney said at the 10th annual convocation of Our Lady of the Consoles Council, Knights of Columbus, Sept. 18.

A dinner-dance was held at Schenck's Restaurant and Motor Inn, Ridge Road West to mark the anniversary. The Bishop highlighted the K. of C. officials and area officers were guests.

BISHOP KEARNEY explained the origin of the title of 'Our Lady of the Consoles' the name chosen by the Greek knights for their council.

The Bishop said that the status of the Blessed Mother will remain the same as it always was and said that the deliberations of the Vatican Council at the beginning were put under Her special patronage.

The Bishop said the knights could be justly proud of the part they played in the Order's contribution to the Bell Tower at the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, D.C.

State Deputy Herman P. Wolkenberg of Middletown, said the foremost project in his plans for the State Council would be a movement to establish a senior citizens' home for the knights. State Secretary George W. Scheeleman was greeted by the knights.
