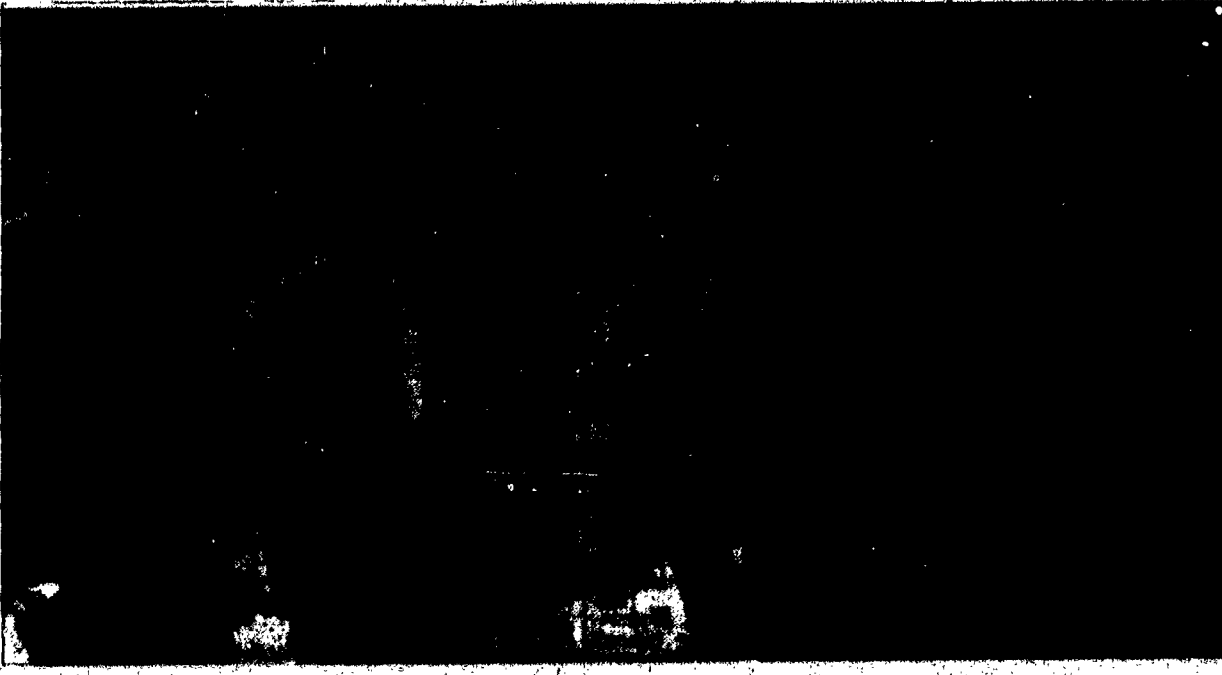

### Golden Jubilee Noted

Retreat Center Drive Readied

Bishop Kearney will mark the golden jubilee of the laymen's retreat movement in the Rochester Diocese by launching a campaign for a permanent retreat center at 8 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 1, in Blessed Sacrament School Hall.

Nearly 200 men from parish retreat leagues throughout the 12-county Diocese will attend. It will be the special gifts committee kickoff in a drive among retreatants for a minimum of \$500,000.

Funds are being sought for construction of a new Notre Dame Retreat Center overlooking Canandaigua Lake, to replace facilities at 249 Alexander St., Rochester.

It was in the Summer of 1914 that a group of laymen gathered at St. Bernard's Seminary for the first weekend retreat. These were continued at the seminary on a once-yearly schedule through 1941, being conducted by diocesan and visiting priests.

Aimed at broadening participation, the conduct of retreats was given to the Redemptorist Fathers with the opening of a house on Geneva Lake in 1942. The Lochland Road house, which could be operated only during mild weather, provided for 50 retreatants.

Still further expansion was undertaken in 1950 with the transfer to the present Alexander Street building, which allowed for retreats throughout the year. The Rochester house serves a capacity of 100 retreatants.

During the last few years, the century-old structure has developed limitations, particularly in possibility for expansion. At times some of the retreatants have had to be housed in nearby apartment buildings. The relatively small plot is surrounded by Geneva Hospital, by commercial and medical buildings, and by residences.

Negotiations are nearly completed for sale of the property to the hospital, which will raze the building and use the area for parking purposes.

THE NEW retreat center, to be erected on a 55-acre site in West Lake Road, Canandaigua, will provide for 150 retreatants. A review of figures shows the growth of the retreat movement in its 50-year history.

During the 25 years of once-yearly retreats at the seminary, the number of annual retreatants ranged from 80 to 200 men. This number was tripled during the eight-year period at Geneva, totaling 626 retreatants in 1950.

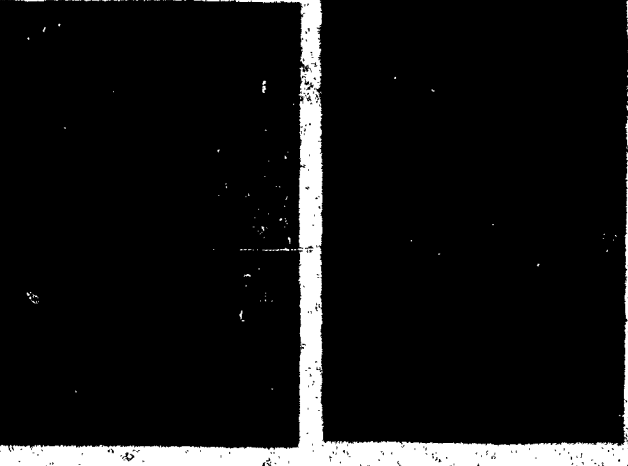

### Father Anthony Giudice, First Capuchin Chaplain

Father Anthony Giudice, 39 years old, who joined the 27th Army teaching Church History and Sacred Music in the Theology Army National Guard last January, is now on 2 weeks annual field training at Camp Drum, N.Y.

In an interview, Father Anthony was asked what made him decide to join the National Guard. "Well," he said, "a friend of mine who was a member of the National Guard approached me one day and asked me to join because there was a severe shortage of chaplains. I felt I wanted to do a service for my country and to the 'Franklin Order'."

Do you find it hard making the adjustment from life in the Order to Army life? "Our order traditionally wears the Franciscan brown habit and sandals and beads. I know of course that I would have to shave off my beard (although I was never ordered to) because beards are not allowed in the Army."
