Fisher Students Hear Goals for New Year

The Presidential Assembly on Tuesday and the Mass of the Holy Spirit offered on Wednesday by Bishop Kearney, Chancellor of the college, marked the formal opening of the academic year at St. John Fisher College last week.

New and returning students were welcomed Tuesday by Edward Courtney, vice-president of the Student Board of Governors, and Very Rev. Charles J. Lavery, C.S.B., president of the college who also introduced new faculty members to the assembled students.

In his address to more than 800 Fisher undergraduates who filled Holy Cross Hall, Rev. Daniel S. O'Rourke, pastor of the parish, was the guest of honor at a kickoff meeting Saturday evening, Sept. 26, marking the initiation of the solicitation phase of the campaign.

Regarding racial disturbances in Rochester, Harlem, and Philadelphia, Father Lavery pointed out that international attention was focused on Rochester, and he suggested that each student investigate for himself why these events had taken place here and what could be done about changing the underlying situations which produced the recent outbreaks of violence.

Commenting on the Vatican Council, the Fisher president said that the Church and the world are changing rapidly and that lay members of the Church in these times; Fisher students are on the threshold of ushering the Church into a new era in history, one marked with new liturgy and significant changes in the role of the layman in the Church.

Bishop Kearney's talk to the students Wednesday dwelt on the Holy Spirit. He told the group that in the Mass he had just offered, he prayed for a renewal of the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit within them in a special way at this start of the new school year.

"Your spiritual development is one of the main responsibilities of St. John Fisher College," the Bishop said. "It is the duty of the college to produce a graduate who will take his place in the community as a Catholic lawyer, businessman, or teacher. St. John Fisher College looks beyond the grave, for it has the responsibility for your eternal salvation."
