

McQuaid Streak Ends At Nine

Their winning streak ended at nine, McQuaid Junior High's football squad will be out to begin a bright new one this Saturday against an invading Holywell team of Olean.

The Knights were decisively outplayed by a fast Holywell team on Friday, going down 16-0 in a 33-13 defeat, their first since the final game of the 1963 season. With their defense yielding over 250 yards to the Bulldogs, the Black and Gold put their offensive hopes by focusing on their first two drives and weren't able to score until the scoreboard had reached 10-0 in the third period.

Halfback Dan Wegman roused them with a 40-yard kickoff return on which he tripped just as he hit open field. That put the ball on Holywell's 40 yard line, and one play later Bill Harris broke loose off right of behind a picture being by Holywell's Dick DeLong and raced 47 yards for the win.

Immediately after the next kickoff Wegman intercepted a pass on McQuaid's 30. The Knights were off again, and they were able to score 40 yards for the big game on the drive and fullback Bill Meyer got the 6 points on a 27-yard crack over the left side. When DeLong kicked the point, McQuaid was up to 13-13. It was all Holywell after that.

McQuaid netted 104 yards rushing but only 10 passing as Holywell was consistently

pursued by Holywell's quick line men and got off only 6 losses. Harris, with 71 yards on 8 carries, was the top yardage man for the Knights. Wegman had 68 on 7 tries and Meyer 55 on 9.

This week, McQuaid can expect another rugged test from Bishop Walsh, which also has a 1-1 record. Last year it was McQuaid on top in a 31-19 squarer, but Walsh was the winner in '62 and '61. The Olean school makes up in spirit what it lacks in size. McQuaid, not lacking in size, will also be counting on its "bounce-back" play to offset the weaknesses that showed up at Holywell.

Knights Capture 1st Place

McQuaid Junior High's cross-country team opened its season on an auspicious note last Saturday at Fulton, where it captured the 5th Annual Fulton Invitational Meet.

The Knights, in outdistancing 17 other schools, got a solid job from their three holdovers and good backing from four newcomers to varsity cross-country competition. Eric Kendrick grabbed an early lead and held on all the way for the individual championship, co-captains Greg Sloan and Dick Lehar took fifth and ninth, and sophomore Mike McQuill finished strong in tenth spot. Junior Chuck Walter gave the Knights their fifth man in 22nd place and Paul Jones and Pat Love were strong sixth and seventh men in 31st and 32nd. One hundred twenty-three runners competed.

In the J.C. race, McQuaid swapped places with varsity runner-up Christian Bros. Academy of Syracuse, finishing second in a 13-school field. Sophomore John Vockley led the Knights in sixth place, followed by Jim Loxter (9), Steve Fahy (11), George Worman (18), and Brian Dougherty in 23rd place.

This Saturday, the Knights move into the largest field they'll face this year, going against 20 schools at the Baldwinville Invitational. The meet will be the first for McQuaid's freshman squad.

Aquinas coach Joe Repp's report on Jamestown reads this way: "They are a tough team and don't know how good they really are. The Raiders from Jamestown turned in an easy, 51-0, win over Dolans in the season opener and went on to stun Olean, a perennial power, 19-0, last weekend.

After scouting Aquinas' loss in Mont Pleasant last Friday, Coach Terry Ransbury said Jamestown "should be able to run and pass against them (Aquinas)."

Aquinas has experience and good size but the Raiders claim the decided edge in speed. Ransbury said the same backfield formations which helped Olean's defense would start, including Dan Lachance and Tony Marchionto, halves; Phil Trane, quarterback; and Jonas Johnson, fullback.
