### Rosary Program Seeks Funds for Broadcast

He describes the program, which he began in 1950, as "richly rewarding." He also conducts the Angelus prayer broadcast on the same two stations daily at 7 a.m., noon and 5 p.m.

### 'Rector of Justin' Review Given By Father Miller

"THE RECTOR OF JUSTIN" is a fascinating study of a complex and engrossing figure, commented the Rev. Robert Miller about the nation's No. 1 best-selling book.

He analyzed Louis Auchincloss' novel at last week's NOONDAY BOOK REVIEW held at the Catholic Evidence Library.

"Auchincloss, relatively new in the fiction field, has established himself as a skillful purveyor of character," the editor of the Courier-Journal said.

THE NOVEL is a many-faceted study of the headmaster of a famous boys prep school in New England. It is told through the eyes of several people who are close to the life of the hero, Rev. Francis Prescott.

"Each narrator offers a new insight, and often a considerable different judgment of the Rector," Father Miller explained. The total effect, he went on, is the portrait of a strong character, a legend in his time, a man of much greatness and not a little weakness.

The author's economy of style was singled out for special praise by the critic. Each conversation, each new description made a contribution to the delineation of the central character.

"Several engrossing short stories are actually woven into the fabric of the main narrative," Father Miller noted in his assessment of Auchincloss' as a masterful storyteller.

Next item on the agenda of the NOONDAY BOOK REVIEW will be "THE CHURCH'S WORKSHOP" by J. D. Crichton. It is the first book-length discussion of the Vatican Council's decision on Sacred Liturgy.

Reviewing the Crichton book will be the Rev. James Russell, assistant pastor of St. Michael's Church, Newark. His review is scheduled for Tuesday, Oct. 13 at 12:30 p.m. in the Catholic Evidence Library, 60 Chestnut St.

Week after week we appeal for a little sacrifice even though it may be a dollar. How discouraged we are to learn of some of our fellow Catholics in America who give not just what they have, but what they are. Take the case of Dr. Waide Hanns. After practicing seven years as an orthopedic surgeon, he gave up his practice in 1952 and for two years worked in a paper mill in Africa. He and his wife who assisted him, without salary and during their stay there endured themselves to the lepers by their charity, their kindness and their attention.

- For two years Doctor Hanns had done the following operations:
1. Reconstructive surgery on 65 claw hands.
  2. Reconstructive surgery on 50 deformed feet.
  3. He grafted 48 ulcers—some of which had been running for years.
  4. He corrected 60 limb deformities of leprosy, nutritional and post-polio origin.
  5. He amputated 10 limbs beyond surgical treatment.
  6. He treated 800 leprosy patients.
- He has also trained a sister-doctor, as do operations for claw hands and deformed feet.

I offer Mass here in Rome every Sunday for all those who unite themselves to the Passion of Christ by a gift to the Holy Father for The Society for the Propagation of the Faith. In Rome, I have discovered that the needs of the Missions are even greater than ever suspected. Never, perhaps in the history of the Church have there been gathered together so many who have suffered for Christ and the Church as have died at this Council. Simply because I am away do not think that absence makes hunger less gnawing, leprosy less ulcerous and the agonies less demanding. May the Holy Spirit inspire each priest and each of the faithful who reads this to make some sacrifice, however small, in order that the needs of the missionaries and the Church in the poor parts of the world may be met.
