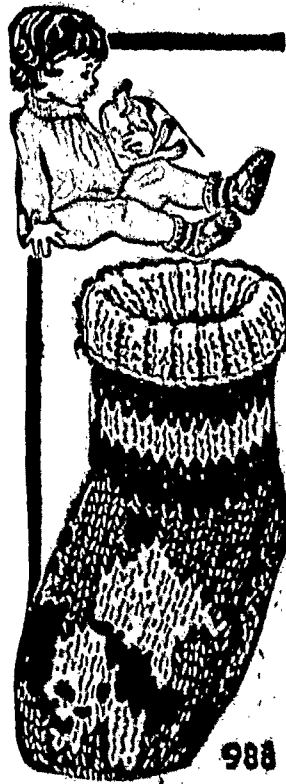

### Politics in Our Grammar Schools

"Politics is Your Business" is the current theme of the Catholic Civics Clubs of America.

Seventh and eighth grade students of St. Charles Borromeo School are striving to carry out that theme.

Through the cooperation of the Board of Elections and local Democratic and Republican headquarters, the students are inaugurating a program which will help them learn a great deal about our democratic process and will give them an enlightening glimpse of politics.

The pupils began by nominating candidates for the offices of the school civics club. "The Catholic Leaders" for political parties were formed: The Progressives, The Leaders, The Revolutionists, and The Suscrates. Each of the parties drew up a platform and organized its own colorful campaign.

At the conclusion of a pep rally, the major candidates addressed the students and explained their aims and policies. The pupils were consulted with the use of a voting machine, and after registering, they cast their ballots. All agreed that this was a truly rewarding experience.

The new club officers are now making plans to continue the theme "Politics is Your Business." "The Catholic Leaders" are conducting an extensive campaign in the school to acquaint the students with our national, state, and local candidates.

Emphasis is being placed on the senatorial and presidential hopefuls. To interest the students in these candidates, club members obtained pertinent materials from magazines, newspapers, and local party headquarters. Debates and discussions will be held on the policies of the two major parties and their candidates. At the conclusion of this campaign, the students will cast their own vote for the choice of President of the United States and other elective offices. "The Catholic Leaders" are also planning a "get out and vote" campaign among area residents.

Through this program these future voters are beginning to realize the importance of knowing that voting is more than just pulling a lever; it is the privilege and duty of every citizen.

### CYO Membership Drive Aims At Goal Of 4,200

The 23rd Annual Membership Campaign of the Catholic Youth Organization got off Wednesday Sept. 30, at the Columbus Civic Center. The workers attended Mass celebrated by Bishop Kearney prior to the meeting.

General Chairman, Frederick W. Viticant reported that the Special Gifts Committee, headed by Fred D. Peshluis had already accounted for about 80 per cent of its quota. Overall goal of the campaign for 1964-65 is 4,200 members, compared to 3,800 last year.

The CYO offers programs for spiritual, cultural, social and recreational development to all members of the community regardless of race or creed.

MEMBERSHIPS are open to boys and girls of elementary and high school age, and to adults of both sexes.

Sponsored memberships are sought for underprivileged boys and girls to benefit them through body building and character building activities. This year, the CYO through sponsored memberships, gave out over 450 memberships referred to it by the Monroe County Welfare Dept., the Catholic Family Center, Visiting Nurses Association, School Nurses Association, Family Court and the Probation Department.

Business men and women and family group memberships utilize the CYO's various programs and activities. Programs and special events include everything from aquatics and archery to trampoline and gymnastics.

The downtown facilities of the CYO at the Columbus Civic Center consist of gymnasium, auditorium, gymnasium, small gymnasium, two handball courts, swimming pool, archery and golf driving range, and a business men's club.

Accumulative attendance at CYO programs for the year exceeded 200,000 individuals.

It assisted other community agencies and groups this past year such as the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Rochester School for the Deaf, St. Joseph's Villa Settlement House, Children's Court, Catholic Family Center and Monroe County Welfare.

Others assisted included the following schools: Monroe Community College, Aquinas Institute, McQuaid Jesuit High School, Mercy High School.

Rochester Business Institute, Nazareth Hall and St. Mary's School of Nursing.
