Best man was Jeffrey Norwick and ushers were James Richards, Raymond Klum and W. Gerald Norton.

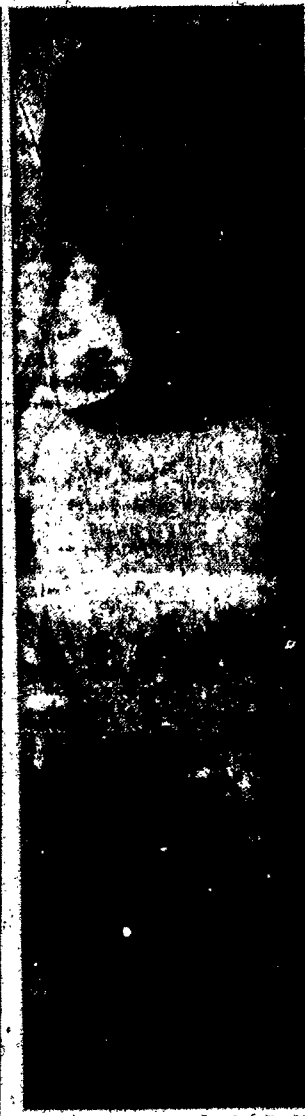


**MRS. DAVID HYATT**

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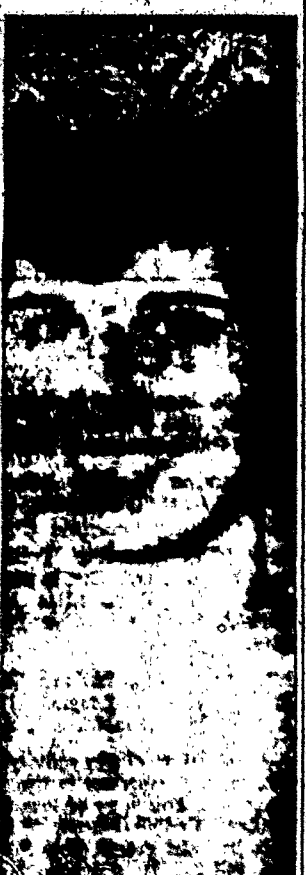
