Scholarship Won
Ellen Murray, Mercy High senior, has won a \$5,000 tuition scholarship to the School of Journalism of Syracuse University. The award was announced



at the convention banquet of the Empire State School Press Association, Friday, September 25.
Miss Murray, an entrant in the news-writing examination sponsored by the Syracuse School of Journalism, won the scholarship on the basis of a news story written Friday at the convention.
Contestants were assigned to report the speech given at the convention's opening session by Professor Edmund Arnold, chairman of the athletic department at S.U.
Miss Murray is the editor of the Quill, Mercy's paper.

Literary Awards
The Mercy High publication, the Quill, was one of ten school papers to receive the All-New York State rating from the Empire State School Press Association on September 25 at Syracuse University during the annual ESSPA journalism convention.
In the "individual writing" category five students received awards from ESSPA:
1st place trophy for column writing — Diane Sall.
2nd place for best photograph — Lauris Kasper.
3rd place for best news photograph — Laurie Kasper.
3rd place for best interview story — Kathy Neary.

Honorable mention for best literary work — Sally Schreiber; for best feature story — Cheryl Farano; for best editorial page — the Quill.
Sister Mary Christine, publications moderator at Mercy, addressed one of the conference sessions on the topic "How to Create Reader Interest." Sixteen Mercy journalists attended the convention.
Nazareth Academy publications were named winners in several areas of student journalism at the Empire State School Press Convention held at Nazareth Academy.

The Spectrum and the Gabriel received an "All New York" rating in the Better School Publications Competition. The Spectrum received the highest rating of any literary magazine entered in the contest. A plaque was awarded in recognition of this achievement.

The Gabriel won a second prize certificate for Best Service to the School among newspapers entered in the competition, and an Honorable Mention for Page One typography.

Individual awards were as follows: First Place trophy for feature writing to Carol Annas of the Spectrum; Second Place Certificate for interview writing to Judith Greenleaf of the Gabriel; Third Place Certificate to Dolores Bruciner, sports writing in Gabriel; Linda Bloom, poetry in Spectrum; Kathleen Crowley, news writing in Gabriel; and Richard Jones, feature story in Spectrum.
Honorable Mentions went to the following: Ruth Crowley, sports writing, Gabriel; Linda Bloom, editorial writing, Gabriel; Margaret Swanson, interview writing, Gabriel; Susan Schantz and Joyce Testa, interview writing, Spectrum.
Eleven students and three faculty advisors attended the two-day convention.

Sister Marie Catherine, journalism teacher and advisor to the Gabriel, was elected a member of the Board of Directors of the Empire State School Press Association at the annual advisors meeting in Hendrick's Chapel at the university Friday morning. Sister presented the Ita Sapoznik Memorial Trophy to the editor of the Immortalist, yearbook of Immaculate Heart of Mary Academy, Buffalo. This award will be given annually to the publication judged best among all entries including yearbooks, newspapers and literary magazines.

Court House Action
Twenty-six Catholic High School students from Aquinas, Kravony, McQuaid, Mooney and St. Andrew's formed one third of the student participants at the Western New York Forensic League Congress last Saturday, September 28, in the Monroe County Hall of Justice.
Thomas Farrell, an Aquinas senior, was elected president of the student Senate. Nominated for speaking awards were Robert Craig and Richard Herie of Aquinas and Richard Rudy of McQuaid.
An Aquinas bill to guarantee equal financial aid to private, parochial, and public school students was introduced and passed in the student Senate. It was tabled in the student House of Representatives. This same bill is on the agenda for the Winter Congress to be held in the Hall of Justice on January 23. The only bill passed by the student houses was a bill to recognize Red China.

McQuaid Debaters
Last weekend the Campion Debating Society of McQuaid Jesuit High School placed fourth out of thirty-seven schools participating in the Seventh Annual Interstate Debate and Oratory Tournament at Calistus High School in Buffalo.
The affirmative team, composed of senior John Sale, and sophomore Joseph Combs, finished the tournament with two wins and two losses. McQuaid's negative team of senior Richard Rudy and junior George Northrup, swept through the tournament undefeated.
The Campion Society's strong showing was matched by the McQuaid Oratorical Society. Junior Jeremy Abbott, finished second out of thirty-seven participants in Interpretive Reading, with a selection from Elizabeth Ryan. Another junior, Gary Valley, took a third place in Original Oratory. Senior Richard Hughes, took fourth place in Extemporaneous Speaking.
