

### Bishop Launches Drive For Retreat Center

Bishop James E. Kearney last week predicted success for the campaign for a new diocesan retreat center "because it is the work of God and because it is under the special guidance of Our Lady, to whom the Notre Dame Retreat House is dedicated."

The bishop was principal speaker at the special gifts committee kickoff meeting in Blessed Sacrament Hall to inaugurate the \$500,000 drive for construction of a permanent laymen retreat house overlooking Ganandagua Lake.

Referring to "the first retreat of the followers of Christ" after the Pentecost, the bishop said that "the immediate blessing of God assured and insured them until the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost."

BISHOP KEARNEY stated that the proposed Notre Dame Retreat Center, to be erected next year on a hilltop on West Lake Road, five miles south of Canandaigua, will be more satisfactory than present facilities at 548 Alexander St., Rochester, and should attract a greater number of retreatants.

Frank E. Wolfe, general chairman of the committee, presided at the meeting, attended by nearly 200 special gifts committee members from retreat leagues in parishes throughout the 12-county diocese.

Speakers included the Very Rev. Michael G. Downing, C.S.S.B., Retreat House rector; the Rev. William Jamison, C.S.S.B., retreat master; Harold J. Coleman, special gifts chairman; Louis A. Langle Jr., head of the general solicitation committee; and Thomas Hughes, president of the diocesan Laymen's Retreat League.

COLEMAN ANNOUNCED that committee reports are scheduled next week as follows: Monday, Oct. 12, Notre Dame Retreat House, 8 p.m.; Region III: Cayuga, Wayne and Seneca counties; Tuesday, Oct. 13, K. of C. Hall, Auburn, 7:30 p.m.; Region IV: Chemung, Schuyler, Tompkins and Yates counties; and the eastern half of Steuben County; Wednesday, Oct. 14, St. Casimir's Church Hall, Elmira.

Bishop Kearney will offer Mass at the seminary chapel Wednesday, Oct. 14, at 10:30 a.m.

Monsignor CRAUGH, who is marking his fortieth anniversary in the priesthood this year, will leave after the alumni reunion for the Vatican Council in Rome.

He translated the Council's schemata (agenda items) from Latin into English for the American bishops. The translated texts amount to a library of approximately 100 volumes.

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### New Convent For Nuns At Notre Dame, Elmira

Construction of the new Notre Dame Convent on Lower Maple Ave., Elmira, will begin within the next week. It was announced Oct. 1 by Mother Mary Brice, Mother General of the Sisters of Mercy, and Haskell and Conner, architects.

Bids were opened Sept. 30 and was awarded as follows: general; Welker Construction Company, \$24,000; heating and ventilation; American Warming Company, \$42,740; plumbing; American Warming Company, \$37,888; electrical; Crum Electric Company, \$38,967. Total cost is \$143,384. The chapel was not included in the bids.

Other bidders included: general; Ineson Construction Company, \$427,976; McLane Construction Company, \$331,850; Smith, Langhans and McLaughlin Construction Company, \$394,492; heating and ventilation; C. R. Evans Corporation, \$46,448; H. O. Gill-Nichols Inc., \$33,779; Shriner Plumbing and Heating Company, \$43,989; H. J. Nichols, \$61,720; Shriner Plumbing and Heating, \$53,200; electrical; Box Electric Company, \$41,945; Cady Electric Company, \$42,392; G. H. and J. T. Kelly Electric Company, \$44,217; Terwilliger Electric Company, \$46,870.

THE CONVENT will be built in two phases, the first to be finished by early spring of 1965. This first phase includes the refectory and kitchen wing, with ten sleeping rooms on the second floor, the center section with parlors, infirmary, lobby, retreat priest's rooms on the first floor and fourteen sleeping rooms on the second floor.

Basement of the center section includes laundry, ironing room, boiler room, recreation room, storage room and two walk-in coolers. Also included in the first phase will be a four-car garage for use by convent school and chaplain.

The second phase of the building is scheduled for completion by late fall, 1965. Previous to this part of the program, the Sisters will move into the completed sections and the present convent will be demolished.

Phase two includes the wing housing the community room, TV room and sewing room, with ten sleeping rooms on the upper floor, bathroom with locker room and lavatories, trunk room, all-purpose room and storage room. A screened-in, glassed-in porch is also part of this phase.

Finally the chapel will be built according to specifications dictated by the new Constitution on the Liturgy promulgated by the Second Vatican Council.

Plans for the chapel are as yet incomplete. Bids will be ready by spring, 1965. Sister Mary Lisette and Sister Mary Eric of the Rochester Sisters of Mercy are at present working on designs for the stained-glass windows and furnishings. One feature of the new chapel will be an altar so placed that the priest can face the congregation during the celebration of Mass.

The new Notre Dame Convent will be equipped with facilities for thirty-five Sisters. According to Mother Mary Brice, it will serve as a center for all of the Sisters of Mercy in the Southern Tier area. The Rochester Sisters of Mercy community is defraying four-fifths of the cost of the building, the Elmira parishes are contributing the remainder.

The present convent, a frame structure which was originally built in 1791 and rebuilt in 1906, was renovated and enlarged in 1964 at the time Notre Dame High School was constructed. Nineteen Sisters of the twenty-five who teach at Notre Dame live under cramped conditions, six Sisters commute daily from St. Patrick's Convent.

Consulting engineer for the architects is Edward Fessler of Syracuse.
