## Kearney High Nips Notre Dame

In a game tinged with excitement, Bishop Kearney stage a comeback when it seemed that all hope for victory was lost, to nose out Dame of Elmira 18-12 at Aquinas Stadium last Saturday night. In this, their second home outing, the Kings broke an early scoreless deadlock and grabbed the lead in the second quarter as halfback Doug Klein found an opening offensive and scored 57 yards to paydirt. The extra point attempt failed, and the Kings held a 6-0 lead.

Notre Dame, previously undefeated in 9 consecutive games dating back to last year, after being bottled up for a period and a half in a tily brook through as Larry Hamilton, flashy halfback of the visitors, exploded for consecutive 49 and 30 yard runs to tally six points. The attempt for the go-ahead point failed, however, and the score remained knotted at 6-6.

The Elmira defensive unit set up their second touchdown with an interception of an errant Phil Smith pass. The fullback Joe Barnitz lugged the pigskin 24 yards and Notre Dame jumped ahead to a 12-6 lead. The extra point attempt again failed and the score remained 12-6. Both Notre Dame and Kearney had touchdowns nullified by penalties, and a bid by the Kings to tie the score late in the second period was thwarted by an interception.

In the second half, neither team could get rolling until the fourth period. Notre Dame appeared headed for a 12-12 tie, but Kearney's defense, however, the Kings' defense nullified the crucial play of the game as Rip Coleman picked off a Mike Bennett pass at the Kearney 23. After a penalty, Phil Smith, the Kings' quarterback, threw a 32 yard touchdown pass to Doug Klein, with Smith running the extra point for the margin of victory.

Notre Dame threatened in the waning moments but two key interceptions by the Kings thwarted them.

The standout for the victors offensively was Doug Klein, Larry Hamilton and Joe Barnitz played key roles for the victors. Both teams turned in outstanding jobs defensively, coming up with one key player after another.

Notre Dame's next game will pit them against an undefeated Corning East team at Corning on Friday, October 9. East has looked impressive in its victories, and last Friday night defeated Hornell 34 to 6. The Grizzlies defeated Hornell the week before 35-0, so this game shakes up as a big battle. East, led by Pierce Baker and Nick Pappas, is leading the West Central Conference.

Seniors at Notre Dame today participated in the New York State Scholarship Examination, hoping to gain a number of the 17,000 scholarships offered by the state.

## Parochial School Talk Highlights KC Supper

"Children - our most precious possession!"  
"This is one reason why Catholic parents, many at great sacrifice, send their children to Parochial schools," according to the Rev. John C. Hayes, pastor of Elmira's St. Patrick's Church, in the address at the initial meeting of the Parochial Schools Association, held at the Elmeria Center, Columbus First Friday Supper.

FATHER HAYES chose the topic - "Parochial Schools - Their Cost and Their Value."

The supper marked the initial one of the 1964-65 Columbian Year at Columbus Center, sponsored by Elmira Council.

Speaking of cost, Father Hayes stressed that the outstanding expense in every parish where there is a school is the maintenance of the school building and assembly hall in 1965.

He pointed out that, in the case of his own parish, direct improvements amounting to \$450,000, were made to the school building and assembly hall in 1965.

Father Hayes cited further, "An example of typical expense can be found in 1962 at St. Patrick's when one half of each church-dollar donation was expended for school purposes."

"Do you think you are getting your money's worth?" the Elmira pastor asked the diners.

"I do and to illustrate the point, last year (1963) in St. Patrick's School, with 410 pupils registered, the expense to maintain the school was \$47,450 or about \$115.75 per pupil.

"This is considerably less than the \$500 plus per pupil cost in the public schools of New York State."

"The value of the parochial school system can be found in

the freedom of parents to select religiously-oriented training for their children, where the moral principles and religious beliefs find expression together with the teaching of the arts and sciences."

"It is this freedom we seek to preserve in our parochial school system," Father Hayes emphasized.

Father Hayes asked those present to share an interest in the Parochial Schools and to pray that vocations stay on the increase.

Matthew J. Jansel, council president, and past grand knight, was introduced.

ALSO SPEAKING were Father Edward A. Clout, pastor of St. Ignace, and Daniel J. Burns, council president and chairman of the First Friday Supper.

Also seated at the head table were Frank A. Beligotti, a director of Columbus Center and past grand knight, and Edward A. Hes, council warden.

The home-style meal, featuring spaghetti with clam sauce, was prepared and served by a committee of Ladies of Columbus under the direction of Mrs. Truman W. Palnton.

First Friday Suppers are open to all Elmira area Catholics who receive Holy Communion on First Friday.

The cost is \$1 for adults and 50 cents for children.

Next First Friday Supper will be held November 6 at Columbus Center.
