China Reds Force Closing OF Seminary

Hong Kong — (AP) — A Catholic regional seminary established here in 1921 to train students for the priesthood from the three southern provinces of China — Fukien, Kwantung and Kwangsi — has been forced to close down.

Church authorities said the anti-religious policy of the Chinese Communist regime had rendered the existence of the seminary "useless and devoid of any meaning."

The last attempt to send young priests to the China mainland, the Church authorities said, resulted in their arrest as soon as they arrived there.

They said that of the 200 priests trained by the Hong Kong seminary, one-third are in prison, while 66 carry out an "uncertain ministry" in China. The rest, they added, are conducting pastoral work among Chinese refugees in Hong Kong, Formosa, and other Asian countries, the United States and Europe.
