

Hilton Plans Catechism School



An all-new six classroom school for religious instruction of public school pupils will be built on church property to the rear of St. Leo's Church in Hilton, Rev. Jacob R. Rauber, pastor, announced this week.

Father Rauber said that campaign drive to raise \$100,000 to help finance the construction of the school will be conducted by the men of the parish under the direction of James Ferron, general chairman and John Welch, who will assist him.
