

Platters' Tin Platter

In the past ten years, the Platters have occupied a good portion of the air time of disc jockeys across the country. The selection on their fifth anniversary album, "Mercury Records," has played a large part in the building of this talented group during these years.

All listed in this LP are newly recorded, but the flavor of the Platters will remain the same. The Great Pretender isn't lost; the appeal it had eight years ago when it was the number one of the country is still there. That one alone is good enough to sell an entire album, but this is one of those rare instances where the other great songs that make up a complete album do a dozen of fascinating things.

You'll also enjoy Little Things Mean a Lot, Volare (Nel Blu Dipinto Di Blu), The Twist, Theme From a Summer Place, The Anniversary Song, Termy, Mack, the Knife, Song From a Hoodlum, Book Around the Clock, The Exodus Song, and a couple of Presley lines of a few years back, Love Me Tender and Don't Be Cruel.

The Platters 10th Anniversary Album is a feat for the stars. It undoubtedly is the record of the month — and perhaps for many months to come.

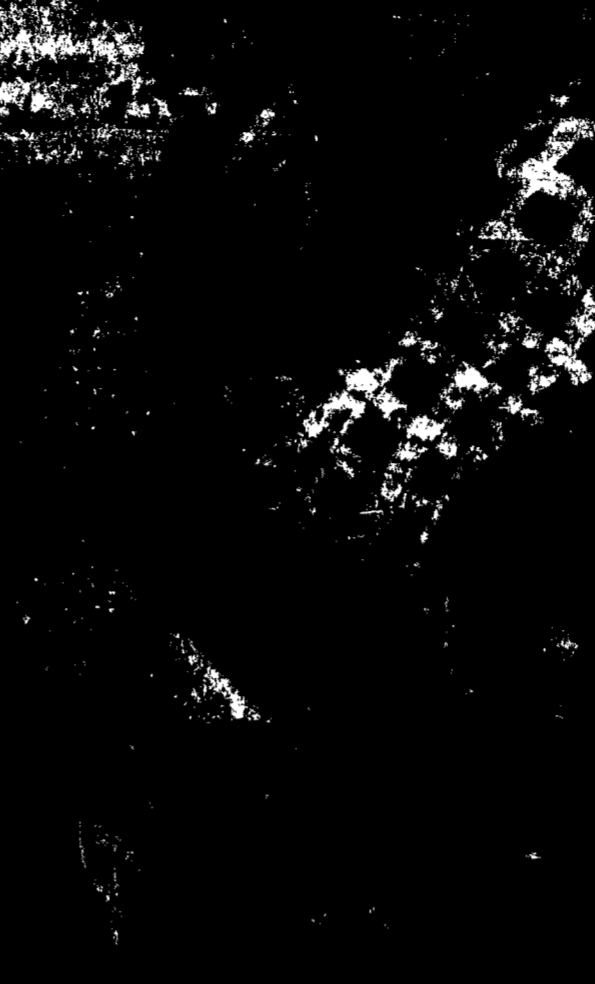
Songs with a religious flavor that have seen their share of the limelight on "pop" tunes from the days of a new album by the Harry Belafonte called "Songs of Inspiration." The Mercury LP contains such tunes as "I Believe," "The Lord's Prayer," "The Ballad of the Fool," and "The Lord's Prayer."

Harry Belafonte has done an outstanding job in arranging and conducting the exact array of tunes in this album. When a group like the Harry Belafonte Chorus is combined with such inspiring songs, the result has to be topnotch.

Other tunes include Walk Hand in Hand, He One Little Candle, No Man is an Island, It's No Secret, Billie Hymn of the Republic, and Whispering Hope. This album is a gem, a gem of playing time as well as with inspiration and beauty.

The magic touch of Johnny Mathis offers a luscious treat in another new Mercury release. This is Love. The superb tone and melodic effect of this disc will pull you into a relaxed mood every time.
