'Black, White and Gray' Given Noonday Review

"A book on race which doesn't pretend to offer any final answers, but it will cause the reader to probe his own conscience. And it's there—in the depths of all our consciences—that the solutions will be found."

This was the summation of Bradford Torrey's "BLACK, WHITE AND GRAY," made by Mrs. Andrew Edwards at last Tuesday's NOONDAY BOOK REVIEW in the Catholic Evidence Library.

In her treatment of the Daniel Bays, a symposium of varied views on the race question, the vice-President of the Monroe County Council of Catholic Women made these comments on the contributors:

"I find it hard to read their ideas without getting very angry."

The reviewer felt that the book should be in the hands of every thinking Catholic who was trying to get a better grasp of the race problem.

"OBSERVER IN ROME," written by Protestant observer Robert McAfee Brown on the second session of Vatican II will be the next book reviewed. Mrs. Harper Shiley will do this critique on Tuesday, Nov. 10 at 12:30 p.m. in the Catholic Evidence Library at 50 Chestnut Street.

On Harry Golden: "A Jewish newspaperman working in the South, he shows a deep insight into both white and Negro attitudes."

(Golden feels that the worst tragedy of racial discrimination is the denial of humanity to the Negroes, who whites see as though Negroes were not really human beings.)

On Governor Connally of Texas: "A man trying to make peace with himself about integration. He stresses the waste of human resources which racism brings."

On Roy Wilkins: "Emphasizes the results of unequal educational opportunities on Negroes."

(Mr. Wilkins noted that Negro children who need education for the space age have often not been even equipped yet for the automobile age.)

On Father August Thompson, Negro Catholic priest in the South: "Awakens us to the painful degree of prejudice which still exists in our own Church in the South."

Father Thompson commented that many white Catholics find it difficult to call him "Father."

"They dodge around it by calling me 'Reverend,' or 'Father,' he said."

Oh Norman Podhoretz, a Jewish writer:

"In a neat twist, he shows us the traumatic effects of racial prejudice on children, from his own boyhood days."

(This writer grew up in a mixed racial neighborhood, where, as a Jew, he was often subject to petty persecution by Negro youngsters.)

Declining any comment on the racist views put forth in and Gall Perrotta represent the girls.
