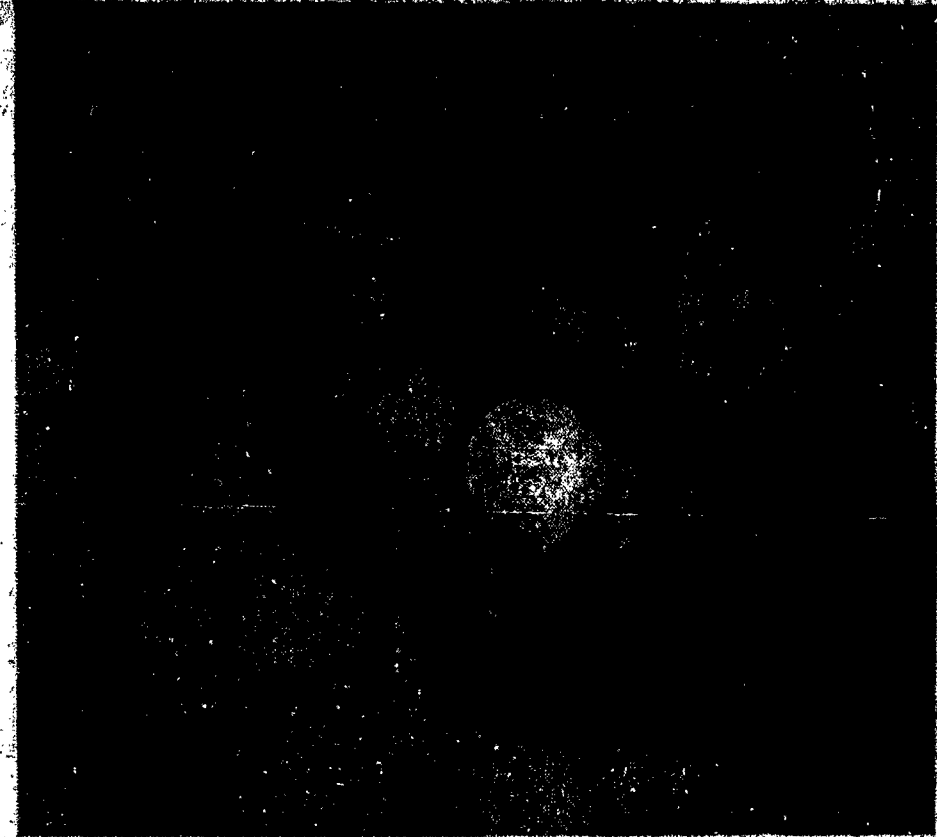

GOD LOVE YOU!

When you hear of "drives" in dioceses in the United States for six million dollars, ten million dollars, fifteen million dollars it might be interesting to compare them with financial reports from missionary bishops at the Council, and to ask ourselves if some of our superabundance should not be shared with them.

One bishop whose diocese is larger than most dioceses in the United States, told me that his Sunday collection from a family of six averages three cents, or one-half a cent for each person. His total income is twenty-two thousand dollars a year, most of which is given to him by the Holy Father through the Society for the Propagation of the Faith. From this he must support all priests and brothers and pay the salaries of teachers in twenty-five schools and all the expenses of poor students and seminarians. The salary of a priest is about ten dollars a month, the head of a rural school receives four dollars a month, and each teacher of catechism (they number one hundred and thirty) receives sixty-one cents a month.

Recently, a church was built in the United States which cost sixty-six thousand dollars a wall! Not a penny, but a cent. Plans for another parish church in a different diocese of the United States call for an expenditure of three and one-half million dollars. Now compare these. Here is a Bishop with twenty-two thousand dollars a year who must pay all the expenses mentioned before which include seven residences of religious, four schools, for boys; four schools for girls, with a total enrollment of five thousand children.

Somewhere along the line there is a terrific imbalance! It is very much as if of the food that we took into our mouths was transformed into energies that went into the right hand and none to the rest of the body. As the right hand became bloated, swollen and useless, the rest of the body would become weak and eventually die. And when the body dies, beware, for it does the hand.

This week, instead of asking you to make a sacrifice for the poor churches in foreign lands, may we ask that you say a prayer to the Holy Spirit that the dioceses and the parishes of the United States may give a share, however small, even one-tenth or one one-hundredth of their expenditures to our poor suffering brethren in Christ throughout the world? I should, however, want you to say if you say this prayer to the Holy Spirit, He may inspire you also to make a sacrifice. Thanks.

GOD LOVE YOU to Mrs. L.K., an excellent mother-in-law, for \$15 "After many years of praying, I finally received a long-distance call telling me that my son's wife had become a Catholic. I offered the enclosed gift to the priest whose patience and understanding were so instrumental in her conversion. He asked me to send it to the poor. So here it is with the hope that it will provide food, clothing or shelter for some poor person." ... to E.R. for \$100 "for the education of a native seminarian." ... to a member of the U.S. Air Force for \$1 "I have been meaning to send you some money for a long time. Now I have stopped 'meaning' and started 'doing.' I am sorry it is so little but it is all I can afford right now."

Governor Hails Private Aid

Newark, N.J. (CNC)—Gov. Richard J. Hughes of New Jersey voiced hope here that voluntary social service will prosper because "it adds immeasurably to the wellbeing of our society."

The governor spoke at the annual report luncheon of the Mount Carmel Guild, welfare agency of the Newark archdiocese.

Hughes emphasized that his stress on the need for voluntary agencies "should not be misinterpreted as opposition to the social programs of government rightly responsive to human needs and the demands of social justice."

Hughes called for "public-private partnership in the service of those in need" and said such partnership "permits us to work on common concerns efficiently and effectively while preserving the integrity of the religious and moral convictions of those we seek to help."

Aid Asked For Miners

Bonn, (NC)—Bishops Franz Heimbach of Essen and Joseph Hoffner of Muenster have appealed to West German Chancellor Ludwig Erhard to take measures to aid thousands of coal miners facing unemployment in the Ruhr area.

Twenty-eight Ruhr mines are scheduled to be closed because of competition from oil and cheap imported coal. Workers have staged demonstrations against the closing.

The bishops' message to the chancellor expressed their deep sorrow at the threatened loss of jobs and asked for effective measures to prevent the most serious human, family and social need.

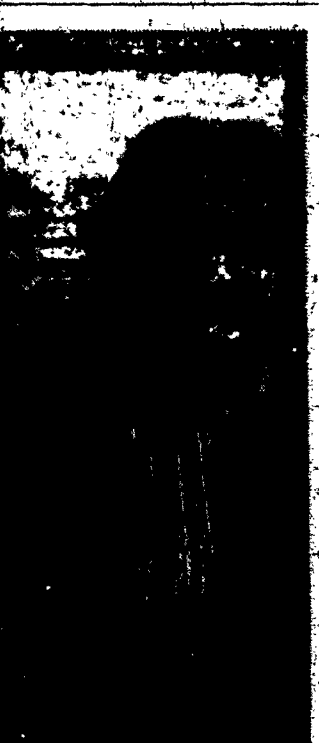

Foreign Students Seek Host Homes in Area

If you would like to join the Peace Corps but cannot leave home, how would you like to open your home to a foreign teenage student from Europe or Latin America who is eager to learn of the United States and her people?

The International High School Student Program sponsored by the Bishops' Conference is currently seeking families to welcome sixteen-year-old boys and girls for the scholastic year 1965-66.

Students in the program are selected by a special committee, assuring host families that the teenagers are in good health, speak English, and have recommendations of teachers and parish priest.

The students are from fine families and are not displaced persons or refugees seeking permanent stay in the United States. In fact they are only allowed to stay one year.

American families are asked to take these youngsters into their homes as a member of the family with no more nor fewer privileges than they would accord their own children.

The program would cost the host family about as much as a family's normal expenses for a teenage youngster. Parents have agreed to send the students spending money each month.

The National Catholic Welfare Conference supervises the entire program, including selection of students, health and accident insurance policies, orientation programs, transportation to and from host homes, and solution of extraordinary problems that might arise.

Students will be enrolled as scholarship students in a Catholic high school, with no tuition responsibility on the part of the host family.

February 1 is the deadline for applications for next year, with preference being given in the order of applications received. Application may be withdrawn at any time before student's arrival.

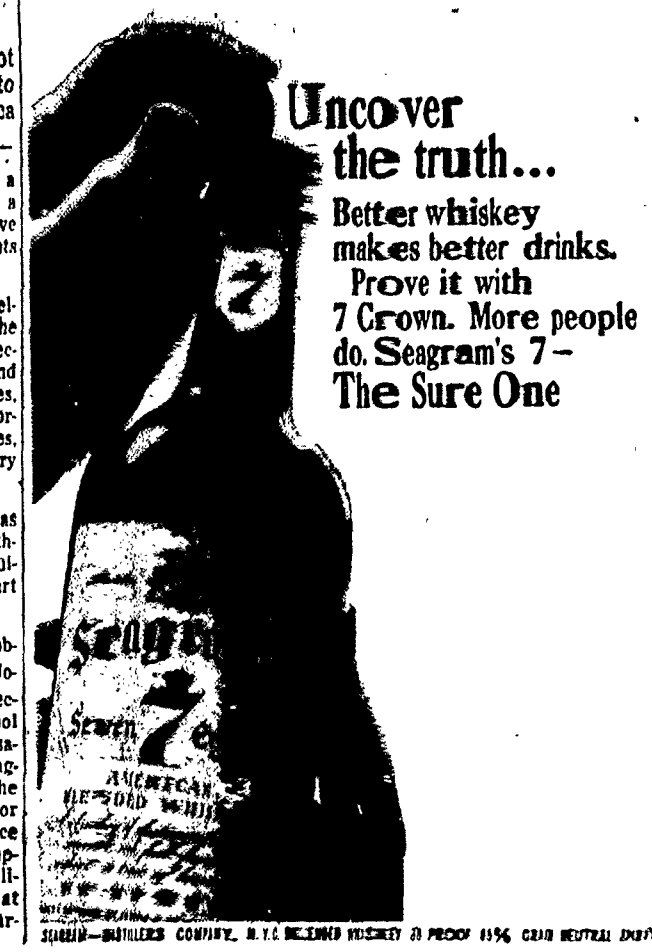
