**Second Place For McQuaid**

McQuaid Jesuit High's distance runners closed out a highly successful cross-country campaign last Saturday in New York with a second-place finish in the 22nd annual Jesuit Championships at Van Cortlandt Park.

The Knights, in nipping St. Joseph's Prep of Philadelphia for runner-up honors, were led, as they have been for two seasons, by Eric Kendrick. Running away from his opposition in the hills, Kendrick posted a meet record of 13:20 for the 2 1/2 mile course and won by 7 1/2 yards over Wayne Carroll of Fordham Prep.

It was a fast race in which the first 8 runners were all under Kendrick's winning time of 13:55 a year ago. Brooklyn Prep, a close third in 1963, won this time by getting 3 men into the top 10 and finishing with 59 points. McQuaid, the first team in the race to get all 8 runners across, had only two of them in the top ten and wound up with 87 points, a better than third-place St. Joseph's. Nine schools from the eastern states competed in the largest field yet for the annual Jesuit get-together.

Senior Greg Sloan ran an outstanding race for the Knights, clocking 13:49 and taking sixth place. McQuaid's other scorers were soph Mike Jaquith in 19th position, and juniors Chuck Maler (20) and Pat Love (21). Sophomore Paul Jones was a strong sixth man in 25th place.

In the J.V. race, McQuaid was third of 8 schools, losing to Brooklyn and Fordham Prep but edging St. Joseph's, Xavier and Regis. Sophomore John Yockey was the first Knight across, taking 8th place. Behind him were Steve Fahy (13), Jim Lagar (18), Pete Rogers (22) and Bob Anzenberger (28).

With their longest and busiest season completed, the Knights show an overall record of 107 wins and 8 losses, with the Fulton Invitational and the Diocesan Championship to go along with an unbeaten dual meet mark. The JV squad was 57-9 and the freshman team 37-10.
