Divine Word Father Directs Filipino Post

Rev. Richard Kraft, S.V.D., son of Mr. and Mrs. N. Raymond Kraft of St. Charles Parish, Greece, N. Y. was recently visiting his parents. Father Kraft, a member of the Society of the Divine Word, spent eight years as a missionary in the Philippines. His work was among the Tinguian people who live a primitive life in the mountainous province of Abra.

No road reaches Lacub, the central town of his mission, and all travel within the mission is either on foot or horseback. He established a high school in Lacub which makes it possible for the poor people in his district to enjoy the benefits of a higher education. He also directs three elementary schools in his mission. These schools have all been made possible by the help of his friends and relatives in the United States.

FATHER KRAFT graduated from St. Charles School and Aquinas Institute. After the war he spent two years at Notre Dame and then entered the Divine Word Seminary at Bordentown, N.J. for one year. He completed his theological studies and was ordained at the Divine Word Major Seminary, Techy, Illinois.

Negroes who buy homes in white neighborhoods often raise the value of homes in that section, a Rochester realtor asserted last week. Attacking the racial myth that non-white newcomers always depreciate property values, George Cobb said:

"I've been selling homes to Negro buyers for 16 years, in practically every case, these homeowners not only kept their homes up to neighborhood standards—they improved them in a way that encouraged their white neighbors to do likewise."

Mr. Cobb was speaking to the monthly meeting of the Catholic Interracial Council, held last week at Holy Family parish.

Home-School Assembly Hears Sister Edwina

Sister M. Edwina, R.S.M., vice-principal of Cardinal Mooney High School, recently addressed the Home-School assembly at Our Lady of Mercy Elementary, Greece.

Parents were urged to commend their children for accomplishments—both domestic and academic. Sister suggested that children be given some family responsibility—a project in which they persevere to completion—a project which increases their own self-confidence.

Of course, since children are "less than thorough" by nature, they need to see in the home, the stabilizing example of parents who "finish" projects.

Emphasizing the dynamic positive role of Catholic education, Sister said the controversy over religious education stands in contrast to the needs of man's composite nature.

Catholic education offers values which help obliterate subtle materialistic influences, e.g. the fallacy that money is synonymous with self-preservation.
