New Seismograph

The 1964 members of the Science Club at McQuaid are expanding the Olenbach Seismology Observatory which was constructed in the basement of the school in 1959.

Under the direction of Rev. Vincent Annella, S.J., these young scientists are constructing a second seismograph, expected to be as sensitive as any in the world. They will make use of some equipment valued at about \$10,000, which they obtained from the work of a famous Harvard Geophysical Laboratory in Cambridge, Mass.

Nazareth Academy will sponsor a Liturgy Week Program December 1-4 under the auspices of the Sodality of Our Lady.

Father William Shannon, theology professor at Nazareth College, will give the program with an address to the student body on "Liturgical Renewal in the Church."

During the week the Mass will be available for discussion in preparation for First Friday Mass offered by Father Charles Connell, school chaplain. Posters and bookmark reminders of the liturgy week have been distributed by sodalists.

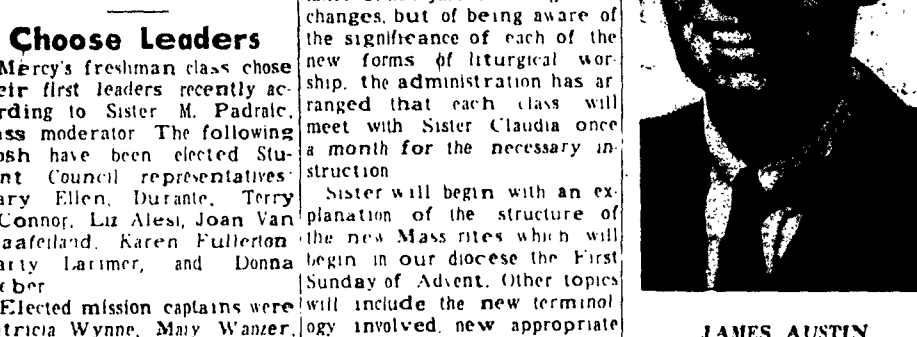

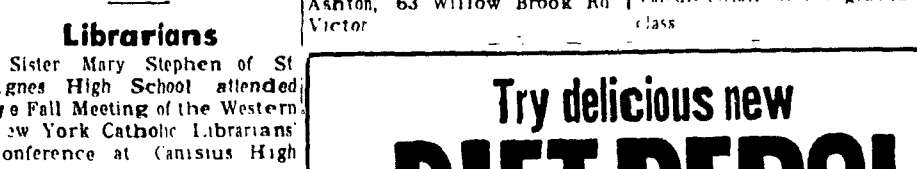
Bellehurst Dr. in Irondequoit equipped 15 orators from five states and Canada on two days of speaking competition.

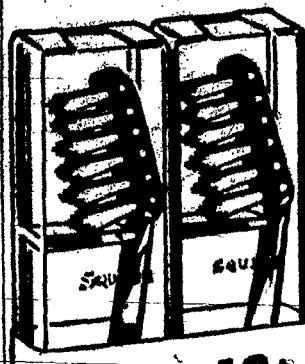

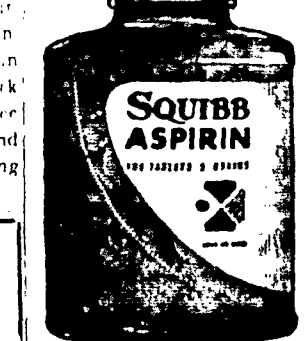

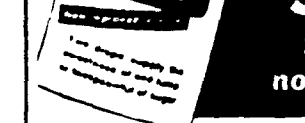
