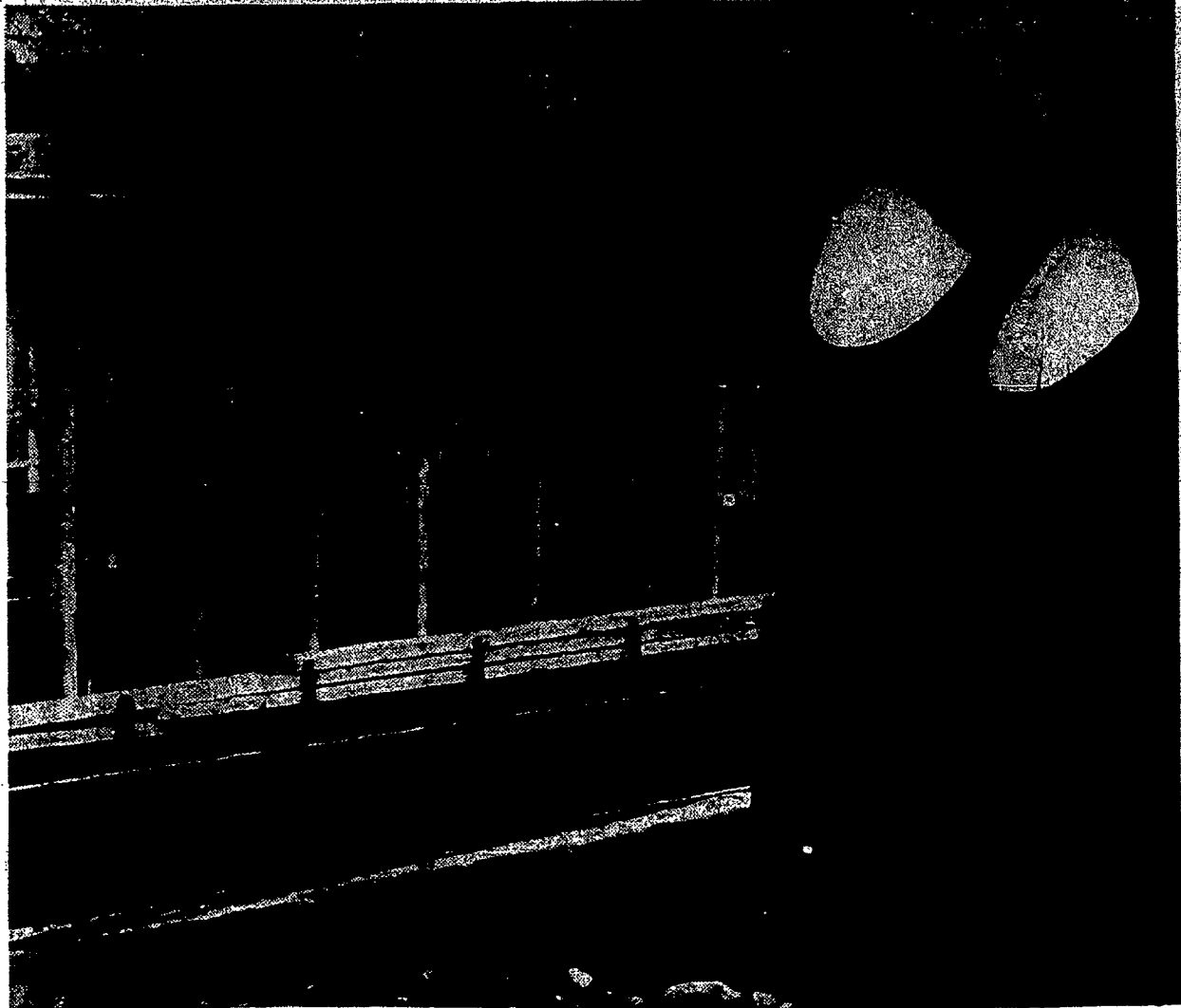

'Vatican II and You' Theme for DCCW Meet

Greater involvement in the Mass should mean greater involvement in the apostolate of the Church, the Chancellor of the diocese of Rochester told a quarterly meeting of the Diocesan Council of Catholic Women at Avon last Sunday, Nov. 22.

Very Rev. George Couzza, one of the panelists on the subject, "Vatican II and You," said that new liturgical changes spelled out more clearly the role of the laity in worship. This in turn, he felt, would more clearly emphasize their responsibility in the market place.

"The Church is all of us—clergy, religious and laity—and each of us has a special way to give witness to Christ in the world," Msgr. Couzza stressed.

The fact that each new era of Christian history provides new light on the Church was brought out by Father Joseph Brennan, Scripture professor at St. Bernard's Seminary.

"The emphasis in our day is on the fuller view of the membership of the Church—in other words, to some people, a new teaching was perhaps overstressed," he observed.

Active participation in the Mass will help us to visualize the Church as the family of God, added Sister Mary Louise, theology instructor at Nazareth College.

"When we sing together, we express our unity, and deepen that unity," she continued.

Revolution Welcomes Missionaries On Arrival at Bolivia Post

"I'll bet no other missionaries ever had such a welcome as we had here," Sister Emery wrote to their Provincial Superior, Mother M. Candida, Missionary Sisters of the Immaculate Conception, Paterson, N.J., relating their experiences on their first day in La Paz.

"We were close enough to smell the gunsmoke," the Sisters reported. "Machine guns and hand grenades went off all about us, and the priests from the Franciscan Central House called to tell us to turn off all lights and to stand back from the windows."

Rev. E. Leo McManus acted as moderator for the panel, which was received with great interest by the 200 participants in the quarterly meeting.

"Several of the insurgents were killed, and many jailed," wrote Sister Emery. "The University was almost ruined inside, the Administration House of the Health Department was half demolished, and the streets were torn up. The Padres said it was all in our honor."

In a later letter, received Nov. 13th, the Sisters continued their report of the progress of the revolution which took place on Nov. 4th. "At about 10 a.m. the shooting started. A school for nurses, not far from us, had a big bazooka gun aimed at Paz's men. We were at a distance, but could see everything. Truckloads of men passed by with rifles, the priests were standing on their porch watching when a bullet missed one of them by four inches. Planes bombed and machine-gunned the Presidential palace."
