Scholarship Funds Sought
Lowell, Mass.—(NC)—The Catholic Journalism Scholarship Fund has appealed for financial support to continue its program of assisting in the education of future Catholic journalists.
The fund said its scholarship grants in 1964 totaled \$10,276 while donations received totaled \$4,225—a difference of \$6,051.
"It does not take a mathematician to grasp that the fund needs additional revenue if it is to continue to operate," the appeal statement said.
In the past year, the fund made 10 grants to students and cooperating universities. It has commitments through 1968 to 15 students now on scholarship grants.
Purposes of the fund, according to the statement, are two-fold: "First... to enable deserving young people to get a journalism education that they could not otherwise obtain because of lack of money. Second... to recruit into the Catholic press trained and professional journalists."

Iron Wedding Ring

Last week, we saw unusual and meaningful wedding-rings—not gold or platinum, but iron! Bearing a legend in Portuguese, "I gave gold for the good of Brazil," each narrow circlet was displayed proudly at a press-conference by Dona Amelia Bastos, president, and fellow-officers of Brazilian Women's Campaign for Democracy (CAMDE). This is the organization largely credited with overthrowing the pro-communist Goulart government only days before scheduled take-over by communist in May of this year.
Speaking in Portuguese, Dona Amelia told us, through an interpreter, that such rings are worn by Brazilian women who have contributed their own gold wedding bands and other jewelry to the cause of democracy after the communists had been driven from their country, taking most of the national treasury with them. Their rings, amounting to three million dollars in take-over funds, enough to reopen the banks, were the first of the contributions made to orderly government in Brazil.
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The story gives particular credit to Brazilian women, quoting one leader of the counter-revolution: "Without the women, we could never have halted Brazil's plunge toward communism. While many of our men's groups had to work undercover, the women could work in the open—and how they worked!"
The author singles out "spark plug and driving force" Dona Amelia, 59-year-old wife of a retired army doctor, herself a former school-teacher.
