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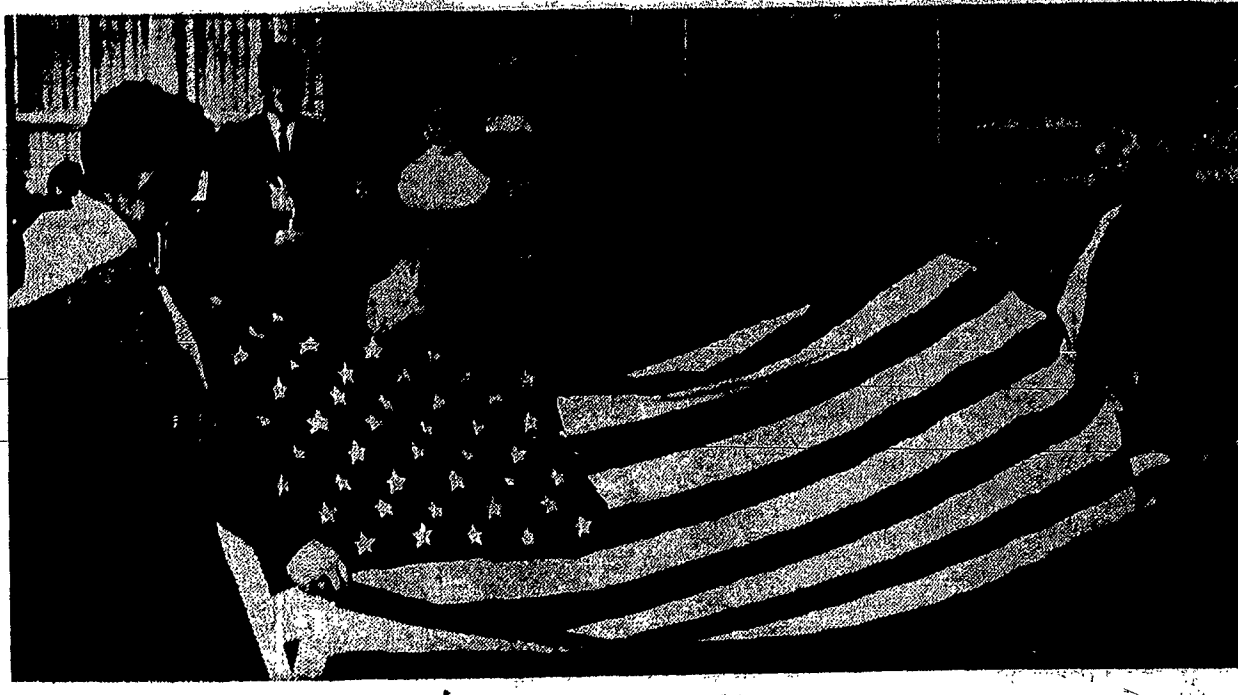
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**Capitol Flag

Booklet Tells Story Of Catholic Education

Did you know that from 1940 public school enrollment has increased by 53 per cent to the present, while Catholic school enrollment in the same period has risen 129 per cent?

"The Human Purpose of Catholic Education" has been recommended by Father William Roche, diocesan superintendent of schools, as an excellent means of telling the story of American Catholic education.

"If we are to win the respect of the American public they must be told the story of Catholic education," writes Father Roche. "They must be concerned with the welfare of every American child, includ-

ing one out of every seven who attends a private school. . . . We must leave no stone unturned to convince all Americans that they have a vested interest in private schools which perform such a vital public service for our country."

The booklet, filled with pictures and a concise text, has sections on The Schools, The Students, The Teachers, The Program, and The Prospects.
