Notre Dame Highlights

A complete fallout shelter, called by authorities one of the best in the state, is being constructed in the Notre Dame basement, Elmira. It is being equipped and planned by the Civil Defense, under the direction of Fred P. Erly, Civil Defense Director in Chemung County.

Mr. John Zambuto, State Shelter Management Director, called the shelter one of the finest layouts he had ever seen. Federal standards stipulate a 40% safety factor, meaning that the person would be 40% safer in the shelter than on the street, in case of nuclear attack. The Notre Dame shelter has a 100% safety factor, Civil Defense experts noted.

Supplies and equipment in the shelter, including food, water and facilities for sanitation, would be sufficient to last each person two weeks, more than the time considered necessary after an attack. The shelter accommodates nearly 1000 persons.

CHEMISTRY teachers Sister M. Carmella and Sister M. Nathanael are taking a course in radiation monitoring, held at Corning Glass Center, a study of the nature of radiation and methods of radiation detection. Studying shelter management are Principal Sister M. Declan, and Sisters M. Jane Frances, Johanna and Corinne, and Mrs. Harold Fisher of the ND faculty. Six sessions and an overnight shelter stay are scheduled in the course.

Blueprints for the shelter area were mapped out by Thomas Kennedy and Stanley Wolkowski, students of the mechanical drawing class.

First Friday of December will mark the introduction of the new English Mass to the Notre Dame congregation. Friday will also be observed as Mission Prayer Day for the student body, which there will be exposition of the Blessed Sacrament in the chapel, and all students will be invited to offer special prayers for the home and foreign missions. Mission Prayer Day, sponsored by the "SMIC," will close with benediction at the ninth period.

Sister M. Declan, principal of Notre Dame, attended an annual convention of the National Council for the Social Studies in St. Louis from November 25 to 28. Sister was chosen as representative of the Five Counties Council of the New York State Council for the Social Studies, and served as a member of the house of delegates, which makes recommendations to the executive board of the National Council.

SISTER DECLAN also recently attended a meeting of the New York State Association of Secondary School Administrators at Lake Kiamasha, New York, and a conference for continuing administrators and administrative interns at the State Education Building in Albany. These meetings concerned the impact of curriculum change on the testing program, and the role of the supervising principal.

The rejuvenated Checkmate Chess Club is planning tournaments with Southside High School and Elmira Free Academy.

Club moderator Miss Rita Lockwood and President Dennis Nurnberg are now preparing participants for a competition. The first tournament has been tentatively set for sometime in December.

Cage Season Opens At Notre Dame

Notre Dame's basketball season will get underway Tuesday, Dec. 8, against Corning West.

The '64-'65 season may be termed as a rebuilding year for the Crusaders, with only two experienced players returning—center Mike Malone, 6'3", who is expected to pull off the majority of Crusader rebounds, and guard Tim Backes, 5'11". Tim is a fine ballhandler and a good shooter.

The other backcourt job will probably belong to Dan McCarthy, a sophomore, a steady offensive player and ballhawk on defense. However, his lack of experience may handicap him. The forwards for Coach Jim Flynn's starting five will be Sy Zielski, 6', and Bob Barnoski, 6'2". Sy has had two years of junior varsity playing, and possesses a deadly jump shot from the corner; he can also drive when the opportunity presents itself. Barnoski, a junior who rebounds well and shoots from around the key, has a trick knee; if he sustains an injury the Crusader cause will be hurt.

THE REMAINDER of the squads includes Jim Merriam and Mike Bennett, seniors, and Juniors Bob McGurran, Mike Amisano, Jack Leonard, Bill Huddle, Jack Kent and Dan Stowell.

The Crusaders' basketball hopes rest largely on how the newcomers will respond to varsity competition.

ND wrestling fans are looking for an improved team this year. Last year was the team's first season in varsity competition, and the matmen finished with two wins, seven losses.

Bigio Mato will coach this year's grapplers, replacing Coach Nick Teta of the '63-'64 season.

Heading the list of experienced wrestlers are seniors Larry Hamilton, who copped the 141-pound class in the Bishop Kearney Tournament last year, and John Livingood. Other returnees include Joe Buffalin, Pete DeSocio, John Bodeves, Nick Rossi, Lou Carlo and Tony DeBlasio. The remainder of the team will probably be made up chiefly of sophomores and freshmen.

The first match of the season will be played in ND's gym on Friday, December 4 against Corning West.

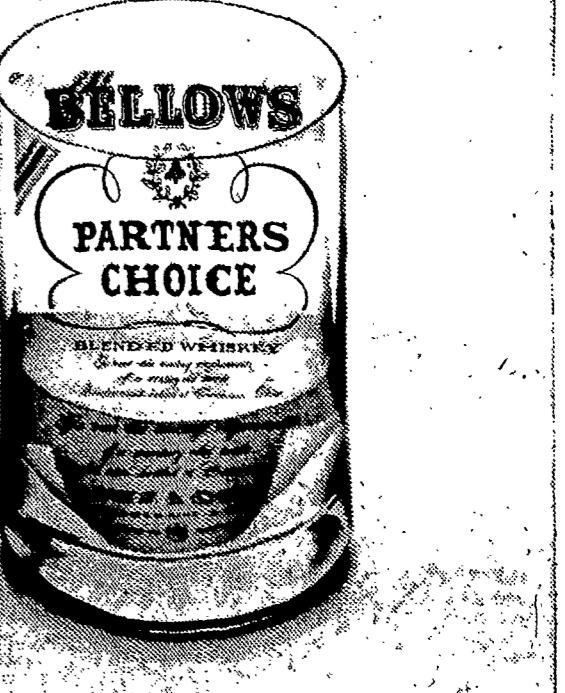
