**Notre Dame Highlights**

The Senior Class will present the play "Becket," by the French author Jean Anouilh in February.

The announcement was made at a senior class meeting held last week. Mr. Robert Lynough will direct the play.

The lead, Thomas a Becket, will be portrayed by James Holleran. Other members of the cast are: Paul Ekes, Hank Lockwood, Kathleen Gartin, Christine Raniewicz, Matthew Cary and David Manaux, with a large supporting cast of seniors. Priscilla Hart and Richard Buzko are student directors.

December 3 marked the beginning of the second annual Mason's candy sale, sponsored by Notre Dame students. The purpose of this year's sale is to obtain funds for the improvement of some of the school's furnishings. Sister Mary Sarto, chairman of the sale, announced that proceeds will be used to purchase rugs and furniture for the sacristy behind the school chapel.

On the scholastic scene, January 1965 will find the inauguration of a brand new club. Plans are being made for the first social gathering of Notre Dame's Latin students early in the second semester.

Sister Mary Coronata, coordinator of the Latin department, has also announced that a newspaper will be published in December by the Latin II students featuring crossword puzzles, jokes and stories composed entirely in Latin.

**Open House Held at St. Ann's School**

Hornell—St. Ann's School was filled with parents, relatives and friends of pupils Dec. 6 for the annual Christmas open house and bazaar. They inspected the 13 classrooms where students' academic work was displayed and later visited the assembly hall where novelties, baked goods and Christmas cards and decorations were offered for sale by St. Ann's Mothers Club and St. Ann's Band Parents Organizations.

Beneath the large crucifix at the entrance of the school a creche was displayed on a gold-lame-draped altar. Each classroom had its own crib awaiting the Figure of the infant Jesus and an Advent wreath, bulletin board or other seasonal display.

Students of Sister Mary Keeler's eighth grade were on hand to demonstrate science experiments to the many visitors. They proved that fire causes a partial vacuum; air forces water to run uphill and that air occupies space using materials such as milk bottles, candles, corks and eggs.

Sister Mary Blaise's seventh grade worked in committees to make salt and flour maps of African villages, showing the agricultural and economic way of life.

Mediterranean Lands was the theme of Sister Mary Martha's social studies project. Students made contour maps and posters showing physical features of Egypt and Arab countries today. They contrasted with large drawings of the architecture of ancient Egypt. On the individual desks were original booklets illustrating the corporal and spiritual works of mercy.

Ordinary materials such as billboards, stencils and string were used by pupils of Sister Mary Victorine's sixth grade to make eye-catching mobiles.

A display of rocks and minerals, including a number of specimens collected by the children, occupied the science shelf in Mrs. James Forman's fifth grade.

"Man Can Change God's World" was the subject of a large blackboard illustration through Mrs. Robert Bishop's combined fourth and fifth grades. It showed how natural resources have been converted through science and man's ingenuity into use in today's complex society.

Pupils in Mrs. James Murphy's fourth grade illustrated their social studies' research on the unique way of life in the Bolivian Altiplano in a large display of hand-made clay houses with straw roofs, animals and pottery.

The wide window-sill in Sister

Mary Raymond Joseph's third grade was converted into a large farm, complete with plastic and paper animals, buildings and machinery.

Angels and stars, strung on slender thread "floated" through Mrs. Edward Deegan's third grade classroom. They were suspended over a cut-paper mural illustrating "The Night Before Christmas."

Pupils of Mrs. Donald Lindeman's second grade illustrated the coming of Christ through a Jesse Tree, made from an actual branch. On it they tied Bible symbols tracing the Old Testament lineage of Christ.

Mrs. Hugh Devlin's first and second combined grade learned how to tell time through clock faces with movable hands, made by each pupil from a paper plate.

A sample of "my best printing" was on the desk of each pupil in Sister Mary Leon's first grade. Red and white paper mobiles floated above the desks.

**Rome Ordination for Father Mulligan**

Rev. Charles F. Mulligan Jr., of Sacred Heart Cathedral parish, will be ordained in St. Peter's at the Vatican Wednesday, Dec. 16.

He will return to Rochester to begin his priestly duties in this Diocese next summer after he completes his theological studies at the North American College in Rome.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles F. Mulligan of 565 Seneca Parkway. His brother is Rev. John M. Mulligan, assistant pastor at Immaculate Conception Church, Ithaca.

His parents, Father Mulligan, his brother Jeremiah, a student at St. Bernard's Seminary, his sister, Mary Irene, and his brother, Thomas, will attend the ordination rite at the Vatican.

THE NEW priest will cele-

brate his first solemn Mass at the Church of SS. Cosmas and Damian in Rome the day after his ordination. He is scheduled to have an audience with Pope Paul next Friday.

He was born in Rochester Nov. 12, 1939, attended Sacred Heart Cathedral school and St. Andrew's Seminary. He made his philosophical studies at St. Bernard's Seminary and was assigned in 1961 by Bishop Kearney to the North American College in Rome where he has attended classes at the Pontifical Gregorian University.

He has served as President of the Friends of Roman American Ecclesiastics (FRAB), which is sponsoring charter flights to Rome for 700 parents, relatives, and friends to the ordination ceremony in the Eternal City.

**Mike Malone Wins Ernie Davis Trophy**

Notre Dame senior Mike Malone, rated by football experts as the best lineman in the state, is the recipient of the 1964 Ernie Davis Memorial Trophy. Malone, succeeds former EFA halfback, Ray Fratarangelo, as the winner of the Davis award, named after the late Elmira football great.

Malone, who was also named All-City tackle for the third straight year, was designated as the outstanding football player for the 1964 football season by vote of the Board of Directors of the Notre Dame Athletic Association.

Malone was also awarded the Joseph Dwyer Memorial Trophy as the outstanding lineman of the 1964 football season by vote of the Board of Directors of the Notre Dame Athletic Association. This award was presented at an assembly Dec. 9, and is being sponsored by the Class of 1962 in memory of Dwyer, who played the line for ND's first football team and for two succeeding years. He was killed in an auto accident in Rochester last spring.

Daniel Minch and Joel Sweet represented the Class of '62 in presenting the trophy to Nick Teta, varsity football coach and athletic director at Notre Dame. Teta then awarded it to Mike Malone as the lineman of the year.
