

McQuaid Rallies To Beat Madison 62-57

McQuaid Jesuit High's varsity basketball team rallied on its home court last Saturday to defeat a race-horse Madison High foe, 62-57.

The Knights, now 2-1, go after victory number three this Saturday with a visiting Watertown High five as the opposition. Game time at the McQuaid gym is 8:15.

Against Madison, the Knights came from behind twice—and made it stick the second time. Madison led at the half, 34-30, and at the end of the third quarter, 52-50, as Simeon Clements fired in 25 points. But in the last period Coach Ken Jones assigned Lance Compa to guard Clements, who then cooled off considerably, scoring only three points and going 1-for-11 from the field. Compa finally fouled out with 30 seconds left, but it was McQuaid's game by then.

Trailing 54-52 with less than five minutes to play, the Knights tied it on Mike Spiegel's short jump shot, went ahead on a long jumper by John Stanley and took a four-point lead on a driving layup by Compa. Clements came back with a foul shot and a field goal for Madison, but meanwhile Tony Leonardo and Gerry Bunec each bagged a goal to cement the McQuaid victory.

It was strictly an offensive game most of the way, with both teams scoring in bursts. At one point, with 5:20 to go in the first half, Madison had a 7-point lead, the largest of the game, but McQuaid banged off a ten-point spurge to forge ahead.

Leonardo started things with a rebound shot, Compa added a jump from the corner to tie the edge to a single point. Stanley hit from outside then for a 31-30 lead and Spiegel scored on a fast-break layup to close out the spree. Still, it was Madison by 4 point at the half, with Jim Rutley cranking two foul s and Clements hitting at the buzzer.

Madison, with coach Dip Murray using a lineup composed of five forwards, used its running game to stay ahead throughout the third period and will enter the fourth before the Knights hit with 15 points.

Fisher Tops Seminary Five 63-45

Scoring first and never headed, St. John Fisher College Cardinals opened their 1964-65 basketball season with an easy 63-45 win over a scrappy but outmanned St. Andrew's Seminary team on the Fisher court last Friday night.

The Cardinals led at half-time 34-21. St. Andrew's stayed within range of the host team until midway through the first period, when Coach Bobby Warner sent Ron Ashe, sophomore forward from Little Falls, off the Fisher bench and into the game. Ashe scored four quick drive-in baskets to put his club comfortably ahead.

Senior co-captains Mike Davids and Jack Galbraith topped the St. John Fisher scorers. Davids had 14, Galbraith 11. Ashe followed with 9 points.

John Barnoski and Bill Casey each scored 12 points for the losers. The defeat leaves St. Andrew's with a 1-1 record for the young season.

The next contest for the Cardinals will be against the invading Polar Bears of Potsdam State Friday, Dec. 11.

In a preliminary game, St. Andrew's High School J.V. squad trounced Cardinal Moore by a score of 49-28. Bob Foss and Pat Murphy were pacemakers of the scoring at 14 points each, netting 16 points each.

Aquinas Defeats Mt. Carmel 72-48

The Aquinas Institute basketball team will shoot for its third straight victory tomorrow night (Friday) when it battles Watertown High School in the C.Y.O. gymnasium at 8:15 p.m.

Aquinas last played Watertown in 1956, winning 72-67 in a come-from-behind thriller.

Last Sunday the Irish ran by Mt. Carmel High School on the Auburn court, 72-48, to claim their second victory of the young season.

Aquinas led from buzzer to buzzer while outplaying the Carmelites. The Dewey Avenue boys were paced by Jim Caverly's 19-point performance. Jim Dudley chipped in 12 markers and Dave Mancuso tallied 10 to aid the cause. The team-scoring effort overshadowed a fine individual performance by Mt. Carmel's Bill Dolan, who pumped in 23 points on 10 field goals and three free throws.

Aquinas jumped off to a 13-6 first-quarter margin, chiefly on the shooting of Caverly, who poured in 12 points in the first half. At halftime the Irish lead had ballooned to 31-17. Aquinas tore it further apart in period three, widening the gap to some 24 points at times.

The Jack Kelly-coached Irish led in all departments, including field goal percentage (39.7), foul shots (18-14) and rebounds (78-45). Jim Caverly made nine of ten throws from the charity stripe. Jim Dudley used his 6'3" to good advantage, snaring 13 rebounds.

Mt. Carmel matched Aquinas basket for basket for most of the final chapter but was unable to menace the Irish lead. William J. Shea, 295 Colerbrook to score 10 points while playing with four personal fouls.

The visiting Irish made it a 100-77 victory in a 9-point production from Paul McDonald in the losing cause.

Next Sunday afternoon (Dec. 13) Aquinas travels to Utica to meet powerful Notre Dame in a 2 p.m. encounter.

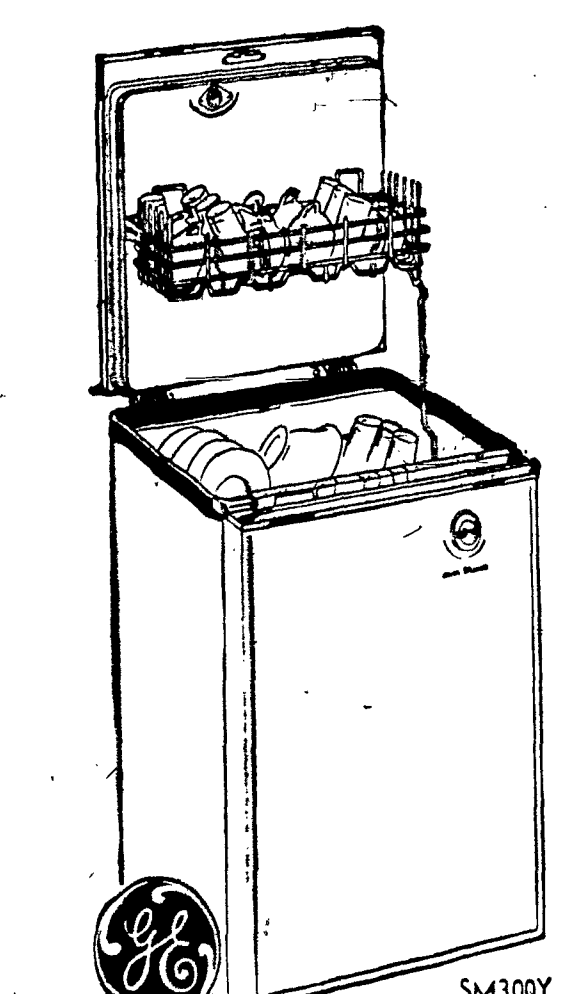
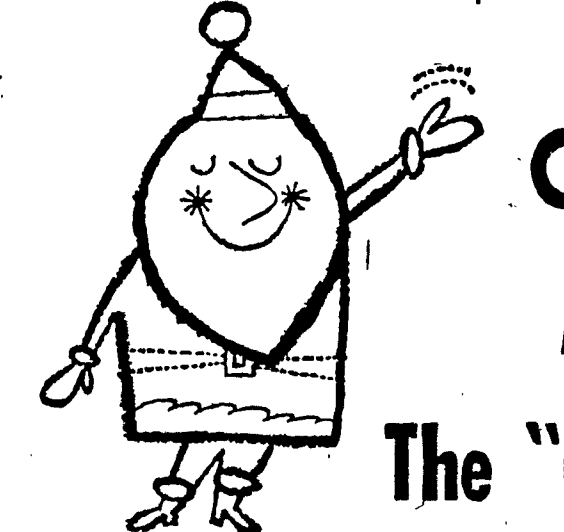
Biel retires after serving the organization for seven years. He will serve on the Board of Trustees for a term of two years.
