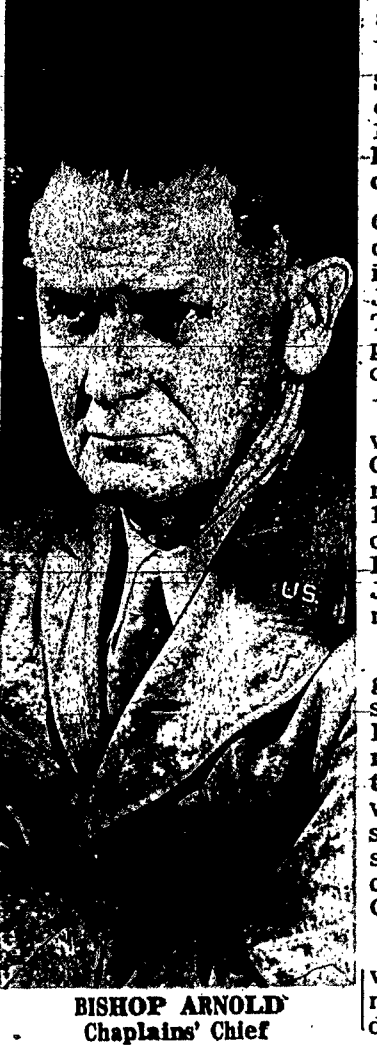


Army Bishop Dies St. Bernard Grad

New York — (NC) Requiem Mass for Auxiliary Bishop William A. Arnold, who spent more than a half-century serving members of the U.S. armed forces, was offered in St. Patrick's Cathedral Monday, Jan. 11.

Since 1945 Bishop Arnold had been Military Delegate — the second-ranking post in the Military Ordinariate, which is the "diocese" for armed forces personnel. Cardinal Spellman of New York heads the ordinariate as Military Vicar.

The bishop died in St. Clare's Hospital. He was 83.

Celebrant of the Requiem Mass was Cardinal Spellman. The sermon was preached by Auxiliary Bishop Philip J. Furlong of New York, who is also a Military Delegate. Burial was in Arlington National Cemetery near Washington, D.C.

Bishop Arnold was born June 10, 1881, in Wooster, Ohio. His family moved to Muncie, Ind., in his boyhood. He attended St. Joseph's College in Rensselaer, Ind.

Before beginning his studies for the priesthood, he learned his father's trade of cigar making—a craft in which he held a union card—and also worked for a time in a steel mill. During one summer vacation as a seminarian, he performed as a clown with the Hagenback-Wallace Circus, an association that helped establish his long-standing fondness for circuses.

The future bishop studied at St. Bernard's Seminary in Rochester, and was ordained June 13, 1908. After pastoral work in Peru, Ind., he became an army chaplain in April, 1913.

Over the next three-and-a-half decades he served at army posts in California, Kentucky, New Jersey, Michigan, Kansas and Texas as well as in the Philippines, rising to the rank of colonel.

President Franklin D. Roosevelt named him Chief of Army Chaplains in August, 1937, and reappointed him in December, 1941. He held the post throughout almost all of World War II, retiring from the army in June, 1945, with the rank of major general.

He was named Military Delegate the same year and was consecrated Titular Bishop of Phocaea on Oct. 11 by Cardinal Spellman. In his work with the Military Ordinariate he traveled widely attending to the spiritual needs of military personnel. He also was a founder of the Interreligious Military Chaplains Association.

In 1946 he collaborated in the writing of a book about the military chaplains corps, "Soldiers of God."

Fr. Philipps Reviews 'Salvation History'

"A popular and appealing presentation of the underlying theme of the whole Bible—our salvation by Almighty God," was the reviewer's summation of Neal Flanagan's "Salvation History." The Rev. John Philipps handled this critique at last Tuesday's Noonday Book Review held in the Catholic Evidence Library.

"This is a book which should be read with one's Bible—preferably a new translation of the Bible, because it really whets your appetite for Scripture," Father Philipps added.

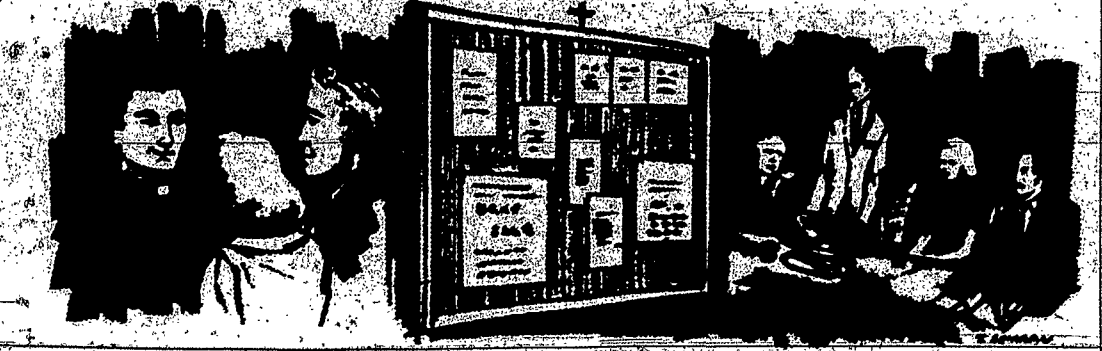
The reviewer noted that in an age marked by great interest in Liturgy, Scripture and Ecumenism, books like Father Flanagan's would meet a growing need.

Holy Scripture will have a greater role to play in future revisions of the Mass, as well as in Bible services which have been recommended by the new Constitution on the Liturgy, he pointed out. Catholics will seek to grasp the meaning of the Bible more than in the recent past.

Among the strong points of the book singled out for praise by Father Philipps were:

- The development of the concept of God's People from a family to a tribe to a nation to a kingdom.
- An appreciation of the many-faceted character of King David, "who remains the archetype of the kings of Israel."
- New light on the prophets of the Old Testament—"for the first time, I was aware of the real sanctity of Jeremiah."

In a humorous conclusion, Father Philipps told his hearers: "If you read this book, it will draw you into a new enthusiasm for the Bible. Then, when someone asks you in a year or two, if you've seen the new film epic now being produced, 'The Bible,' you can say: 'I haven't seen the movie but I've read the Book!'"
