Unitarians Oppose Aid

Boston — (RNS) — The Unitarian Universalist Association has warned President Johnson that "any gift of public money to private schools would be viewed with grave concern" by the 154,000-member denomination.

Dr. Dana McLean Greeley, the association's president, signed the message which referred to the President's State of the Union address to Congress, in which the Chief Executive made a number of proposals to aid education which would indirectly assist private and parochial schools.

Dr. Greeley told the President that while the association applauded his address, especially his plan for the improvement of education, it was "disturbed" by reports that the administration intends to promote the concept of shared time as a means of subsidizing private church-related schools.

1965 Almanac Published

New York — (NC) — An article titled "The Pill" reporting the Church's position on birth control, will be a feature of the 1965 National Catholic Almanac, scheduled for release Jan. 22, Doubleday & Co., Inc. publisher, announced.

The almanac, described as a complete encyclopedia in one volume, has been published annually for 61 years. It is compiled by a group of Franciscan priests at Holy Name College, Washington, D.C., plus a staff headed by Father Felician Foy, O.F.M., editor, at St. Anthony's Guild, Paterson, N.J.

In addition to new material, the Almanac contains its regular features, brought up-to-date and revised where necessary. These include biographies of cardinals, archbishops and bishops; listings of religious communities and lay organizations; a dictionary of Catholic terms; a calendar of feast days; and various Catholic statistics.

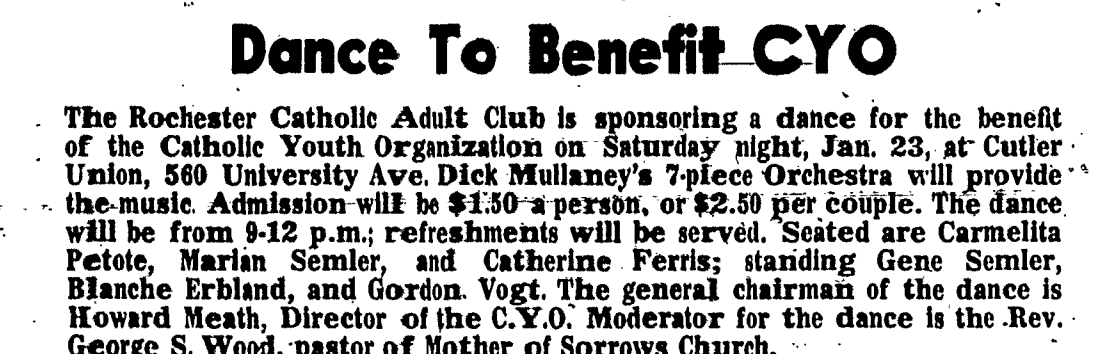

School Prayer OK'd By Judge

Grand Rapids — (NC) — A U.S. district court judge has approved prayer by students in public schools provided that it is strictly voluntary and does not take place during class time.

Judge Noel P. Fox turned down a request by nine parents in the Jenison school district for an injunction against the school board to halt in-school prayer and Bible reading. He specified, however, that students must be free not to take part in such exercises, that the exercises must be held elsewhere than in the students' regular home rooms, and that they must take place either before or after the regular school day.

Less Debate, More Voting At Council

Vatican City — (NC) — Less debate and more voting is the outlook for the fourth and final session of the ecumenical council that begins on Sept. 14.

That is the opinion expressed in an interview by the director of the council press office, Msgr. Fausto Vallain.

Msgr. Vallain said that as a result it may not be necessary to have five general council meetings a week. He reported that a procedure is being considered which may cut down on the number of meetings and give more time for council commissions to get pending documents into final form.

Council Fathers, however, will still have to debate four major schemas—religious freedom, the Church in the modern world, missions, and priestly life—and ministry.
