

Cardinals Beat Kings

Cardinal Mooney High School defeated Bishop Kearney High School 49-30 in a thrilling basketball game before 3000 excited spectators. The game, which promises to be another keen rivalry on the city's Catholic High School sports scene, was a hard fought, spirited affair that complimented both schools. It marked the initial cage meeting of the two schools on a varsity level and the first victory for the Cardinals over the well coached Kings.

Contest at the War Memorial was first between the two schools.

The Cardinals jumped to a 4-0 lead seconds after the opening whistle and entered the second period with an 11-8 advantage. It was 21-12 at half-time as the Mooney defense tightened up. Mooney then opened up the gap in the third period, mainly on the scoring of Terry Murphy, Kevin Dugan and Jim Werth, who went into the final period with a 38-16 lead.

Both clubs showed the same shooting percentage from the free throw line, hitting on 12 out of 28 tries. The Cardinals, however, had a better night from the floor while many of the Kearney's shots rolled off the rim.

Terry Murphy furnished the winning spark for the Cardinals, tossing in 16 points, half of the total in the first half. Kevin Dugan contributed 9 points while Otis Davis threw in 8 for Mooney. Jim Werth, Tim Kier, Ken Harrington and Jim Muslow displayed good defense that kept their tough opponents from scoring.

For Bishop Kearney, Bob Case had 11 points on 4 field goals and 3 free throws. Tom Hood and Walt Szarachi played fine defensive games while Bob Case rebounded strongly.

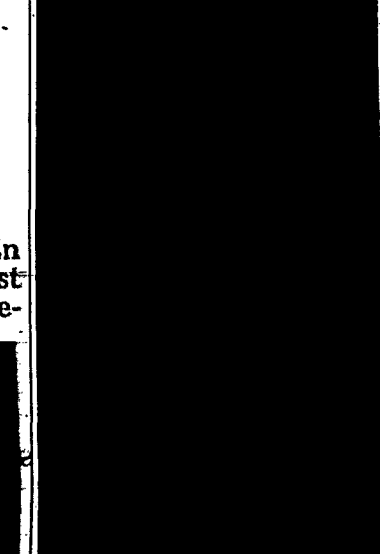
