"Letters To Nancy" Rated Excellent

"Vision—meaning fidelity to a Christian view of life, is the absorbing theme of this fine book," said Diane DeCocq of Father Andrew Greeley's "Letters to Nancy."

Miss DeCocq reviewed the book at the Catholic Evidence Library last week, and found it "fresh, realistic and readable."

Father Greeley uses the vehicle of a series of letters to a 19-year-old college freshman to give his views of the "vision" a committed young Catholic woman should have.

Her vision must include several factors, the Chicago priest-sociologist feels. These will encompass her specific vocation, her prayer life and her commitment to the world she lives in.

The reviewer found Father Greeley's discussion of the "marriage mania," very worthwhile. He feels that today's American culture pressures many people into marriage before they are ready, and at times fails to give them room for full personal development.

Father Greeley favors some apostolic involvement outside the home for any woman who can manage it, and even outside employment (full or part-time) as long as it doesn't cripple her family responsibilities.

The reviewer, an adult Socialist, thought that "Letters to Nancy" had some fine insights on what Christian education should be.

The priest-author says that education should develop a sensitive, flexible mind in a woman and bring out all her talents. Ideally, her education should include a solid career formation and help her to combine a home-and-career life in later years.

In her conclusion, Miss DeCocq said that the Greeley book would not only be valuable for young women, especially college students, but also for their parents, "in helping them to see what 'Christian vision' could really be like."

Next review scheduled in the Noonday Book Review will be Michael Farrell's novel, "Thy Tears Might Cease." Guest critic will be Father Ciaran Ryan, currently pursuing graduate science studies at the University of Rochester.

His review will take place on Tuesday, Feb. 9 at 12:30 p.m. The series is sponsored by the Monroe County Council of Catholic Women.
