## Five Million Scouts Mark 55th Anniversary

As the Boy Scouts of America movement celebrated its 55th anniversary this week (Feb. 7-13), its membership stood at an all-time high with 5,555,700 boys and adult leaders now enrolled. This was an increase of two and a half per cent over a year ago.

Since 1910 there have been almost 40 million boys and leaders identified with the Boy Scouts of America.

Catholic boys in great numbers are active in the Scout movement at all levels. They reap the benefits of the general scouting program, as well as the specialized programs that have been set up for Catholic scouting.

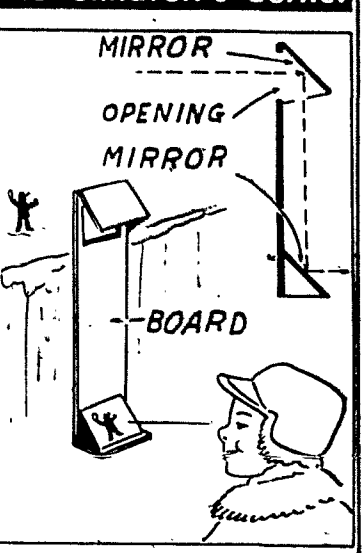
Last year, 13,476 Ad Altare Dei awards were given to Catholic scouts; 10,523 Del awards to Cub Scouts and 139 Pope Plus XII awards to Explorers.

Some 45,500 Scouts and Explorers participated in over 250 retreats for Boy Scouts.

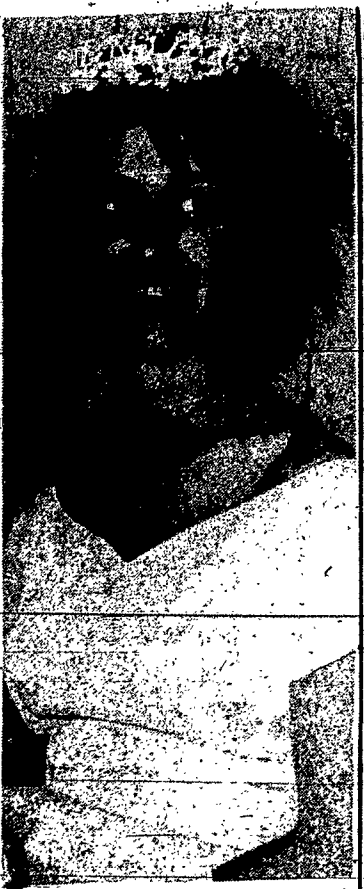

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## GOD LOVE YOU Most Reverend Fulton J. Sheen

Love has three intimacies or means of communication. One is Speech. We would never know that anyone loved us unless he told us so. A word is the summation of the soul, all that it is, all that it has been and all that it will ever be. We need only hear a person speak and we know whether he is learned or ignorant, good or bad.
