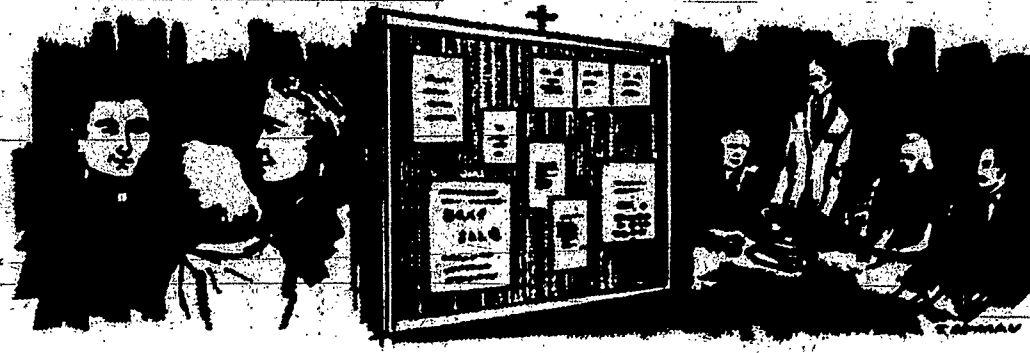

Area alumnae are taking part in the \$12,000,000 campaign for funds for Trinity College, Washington, D.C. with 1974 as the achievement date.
