

## Expanded Lecture Series Scheduled At Nazareth

The poetry editor of the Saturday Review of Literature and a noted existentialist philosopher and dramatist head a distinguished group of lecturers who will appear at Nazareth College during the second semester.

Eight lectures, all open to the public, are scheduled in an expanded program that marks the 40th year that Nazareth has offered a lecture series.

Sister Jane, chairman of the lecture series is assisted by Sister Marie Angela.

The Saturday Review's John Ciardi will deliver the Dante Commemorative Lecture March 1 at 8 p.m. His subject will be "The Longest Walk in the Universe," an analysis of Dante's Divine Comedy.

Philosopher Gabriel Marcel will deliver the Nazareth College 40th anniversary lecture March 22 at 8 p.m. His topic will be: "Wisdom in an Age of Technology."

Six other well-known lecturers will speak at Nazareth on the following dates:

Feb. 18: Claude Bourcier, Dean, French School, Middlebury College. 10:30 a.m., "Today's France: Feverish and Stable" (in French); 3:30 p.m., "After the Absurd What?"

March 12: Rev. Rollins E. Lambert, Colvert House, University of Chicago. 11:30 a.m., "Racial Justice: The Moral Issues"; 8 p.m., "Racial Justice: Catholic Leadership."

March 25: Tadashi Akamatsu, Research Staff Member, Japan Institute of Labor. 11:30 a.m., "Characteristics of Japanese Labor Force and Labor Movement"; 2:30 p.m., "Japanese Intelligence"; 3:30 p.m., "Japanese Society in Comparison with the Developed and Developing Countries."

April 6: John Solowski, artist—presently on the R.I.T. faculty and a former professor at Nazareth College. 8 p.m., "The Film as an Art Form."

April 29: Stanley Hymen, staff writer, The New Yorker. 3:30 p.m., "The Armed Vision: Modern Literary Method"; 8 p.m., "The Critic's Credentials."

May 4: Allan Gilbert, Dante and Milton scholar. 8 p.m., "The Poetry of Daily Life: The Observer in Purgatory."

The breadth and quality of this year's program is representative of the type of lectures Nazareth has presented through the years. Lectures have ranged from "Scholastic Philosophy in the Middle Ages" to "Juvenile Delinquency," from "Communism and the Need for Christian Leaders" to "Racial Problems," from "Shakespeare in the Theatre" to "Problems of the African Nations." Leaders in the academic world have been balanced by specialists in international affairs, political analysis, social justice, the Ecumenical movement, and other areas of vital interest in the modern world.

Speakers have ranged from famed philosophers Etienne Gilson and Martin D'Arcy to poet W. H. Auden, from liturgical experts Virgil Michel and Damasus Wingen to former Communist Louis Budenz who exposed the conspiracy for what it was, from the U.N. delegate to India to author Douglas Hyde. And some guests even sang their messages—notably Gladys Swarthouse and Vivian Della Chiesa.

Nazareth officials are confident that this year's program will carry on in that tradition which has always been designed not only to enrich the lives of faculty and students, but also the general community.

## Civics Club Students Study 'Dropout' Subject

St. Rita's Leaders of Tomorrow Civics Club has just completed a series of interviews with high school principals and guidance directors in order to become better informed on the subject of high school dropouts.

This is in conjunction with the Civics Clubs of America project that suggests for the month of January a study of the problem of dropouts.

The club organized groups to visit various high schools in the area and to interview the principals or guidance directors on the subject. Each group in turn brought back information which included a direct quote from the interviewed. This was used for a panel discussion with the club.

Among the schools visited were: Bishop Kearney, McQuaid Jesuit, Nazareth Academy, and Webster High School. Sister Jamesetta of Nazareth Academy was quoted as saying:

"A person without a high school diploma in our American society indeed is 'underprivileged.'"

To climax the project, Mr. George Beede of Eastman Kodak Co. addressed the club on the value of a high school education in today's world of employment. Mr. Beede stressed, "As for major corporations it is a mandate that you have a high school education." Accompanying Beede were Miss Lelan Zeigler and Evan Schmidt, representative of the club.

Hoey is the first winner of the award who was not a PGK. He has been an outstanding worker of the council and a trustee for many years.

The Requiem Mass was celebrated by Rev. George Vogt. Interment was at St. Paul of the Cross Cemetery, Honeye Falls.

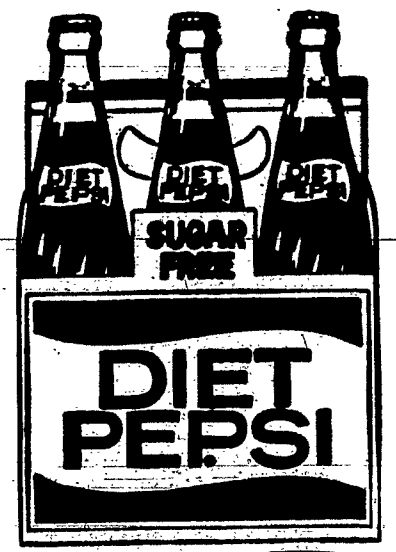
