Mooney Defeats N.D., St. Francis

Cardinal Mooney High School basketball team swept both games this weekend with victories over Notre Dame of Batavia and St. Francis of Athol Springs.

This marked the 9th and 10th victories against three defeats for the defensively-minded Cardinals.

On Saturday, the Cardinals met Notre Dame and defeated the Irish 53-44 as all 13 Mooney players saw action. Again it was the pressing defense that kept the visitors from organizing an offensive attack. Terry Murphy paced the Mooney scorers with 24 points while Kevin Dugan contributed 15.

St. Francis of Athol Springs invaded the Mooney gym on Sunday and ran into a stingy defense that forced their opponents into numerous ball handling miscues. The final score was 50-31 in favor of Mooney and it marked the fifth time this season that the Cardinals were able to keep their opponents under the 40 point mark.

Mooney exhibited some fine rebounding by Jim Muslow, Jim Harrington, Jim Werth and Otis Davis and some outstanding ball handling by Terry Murphy, Kevin Dugan and Tom Bringley. Murphy tossed in 14 points, Harrington had 11, while Kevin Dugan had 10 points to pace the scorers.

Cardinal Mooney plays two games this weekend as it meets Bishop Gibbons of North Tonawanda, the current leader of the Buffalo Catholic League. Gibbons, a tall, sharp-shooting team paced by 6'6" Gary Burrgasser, lost to the Cardinals earlier this season by a score of 67-60 in an exciting contest. The game will be played on Friday night, Feb. 19 on the Mooney court.

On Sunday, Feb. 21, the Cardinals travel to Baker Catholic in Lackawanna. Baker Catholic was defeated earlier by Cardinal Mooney by a score of 68-39.

Fisher Topples Toronto 78-60

Paced by Jack Galbraith, who poured in 21 points, St. John Fisher College won its eighth game of the year Saturday as the Cardinals turned back traditional rival St. Michael's of Toronto, 78-60, in a game played in the Fisher Athletic Center.

Earlier in the week Fisher defeated Genesee State College by a 58-54 score and lost to R.I.T. 70-60.

In Saturday's game the Cards had a 10-point lead at half-time. Playing a more wide open game than usual, they kept up the pace in the second period, running up their highest score of the year by game's end.

Galbraith was ably assisted by Jerry McCabe in the scoring column with 15 points. St. Mike's Ray Schadtler was the game's top point gatherer with 23, including 9 of 11 attempts from the free throw line.

In an abbreviated preliminary contest, the local St. Michael's alumni group, spearheaded by a trio of Irish grads who are now faculty members at St. John Fisher, outlasted the Fisher "old grads," 34-21.

Against R.I.T. the Cardinals enjoyed a 2-point lead at half-time but lost it when play resumed and were not in contention for most of the second period. McCabe scored 15 points to lead Fisher in this game.

The Genesee-Fisher contest was close all the way. The visitors came within two points of tying the score with one minute to go, but their rally ended at that point. Ron Ashe was the top Cardinal scorer with 17.

The Bombers made it a winning night all the way, winning the jayvee game, 55-48.

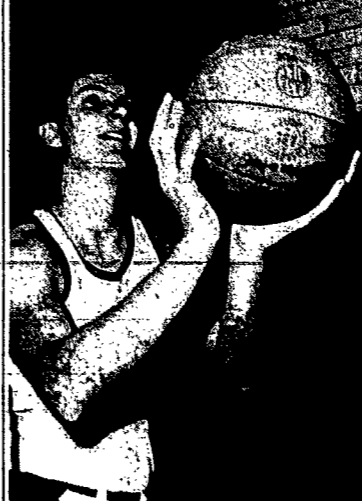

Kings Top Olean, Lose To Duffy

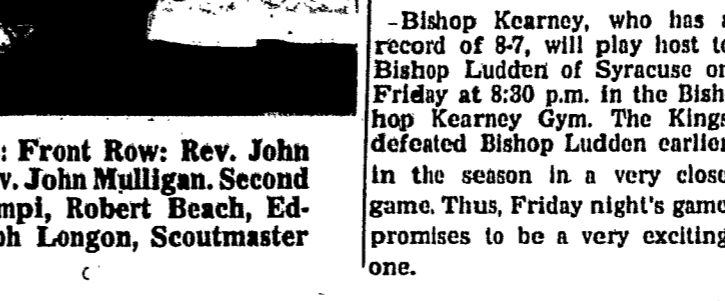

Fordham Prep Edges McQuaid

McQuaid Jesuit High suffered its second straight loss and saw its season mark drop to 12-4 last Saturday as the Knights were nipped by a visiting Fordham Prep team, 65-61, in an exciting seasaw battle at McQuaid.

Earlier in the day, the McQuaid Frosh came out on the short end of a ragged 35-22 game at Mt. Carmel of Auburn. Bill Spies had 10 points in a losing cause as the Knights' record dipped to 5-8.

This Friday, McQuaid returns to local competition against Madison, one of the city league front-runners. The Knights beat the Wilson Parkers, 63-57, back in December and can expect another tough challenge from high-scoring Simeon Clements and his speedy mates.

Against Fordham, a December victim by the same 63-57 count, McQuaid took an early 15-12 advantage, with the lead changing hands 8 times in a nip-and-tuck first quarter. The second quarter saw more of the same, with McQuaid up by 35-33 at half-time.

In the third period, the seasaw went on, but McLaughlin's 10 points sparked the Rams into a 48-41 deadlock at the buzzer.

It was McLaughlin who finally broke the standoff when the score had gone to 52-52. His 3-point play, followed by a tap-in, made it 57-52 with a little over 6 minutes to play. Leonardo came back with 2 jump shots for McQuaid, but McLaughlin sandwiched a layup between them, making it 59-58.

At that point, a procession of technical fouls began, the first against McLaughlin for protesting a call, the second against Fordham coach, Jack Sullivan, for being on the court, and the third against Sullivan for protesting the second. Sullivan countered by taking his squad back to the locker room, apparently in refusal to continue the game.

But the Little Rams, with the officials waving the forfeit that was called for in the rules, came out in about ten minutes and the game resumed. Leonardo had cashed only one of the technicals, so the count stood at 59-57, with 3:20 left. Fordham senior Greg Martin ruined the Knights' then, hitting a jump shot for a 61-57 lead and sinking two clutch fouls and a layup in the final 20 seconds.

In the preliminary match, McQuaid's J.V. squad bested Bishop Kearney's for the third time this season as Bob Weingartner scored 22 points in a 50-46 victory. Weingartner and Paul Jones were top rebounders with 13 and 11. The J.V. mark is now 12-2.

Martin, who didn't even play in the first game between the two teams, had a big 19 points for the winners while Lance Compa and Mike Spiegel had 13 and 10 for McQuaid. Leonardo and Jerry Bunce led the rebounding battle with 10 apiece.

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
