Advisory Board Formed To Guide Loreto House

With the formation of a 15-person Advisory Board which ranges from a nun to the city police Chief, Loreto House, one of Rochester's most unique ventures in the racial field took a firm step forward recently.

The nun is Sister Rose Alice, chairman, Nazareth College Music department and the Police Chief, of course, is William Lombard. Fifteen other prominent Rochesterians make up the rest of the advisory group. From their numbers, a 7-man Board of Directors will be chosen.

The board heard a "Statement of Purpose" presented by Isabelle M. Dolan, originator of Loreto House and a progress report reviewing the activities of the project since its inception almost two years ago.

Dr. John Abbott, head pathologist at Genesee hospital acted as interim chairman for the meeting, held on Feb. 12. He said that the board's function would be to render counsel to Loreto House and its volunteer staff of 31, and to contact interested persons and groups to support the program.

The statement of purpose stressed that Loreto House would provide a commitment to Christ by being "a haven in the community," working in Negro and Negro-white neighborhoods. The approach will focus on children first, and then on children with their parents.

Miss Dolan said that the many-sided approach to the total enrichment of the children, could be summed up under three titles—arts, morals and manners.

She said that her experience had shown that all people have some artistic talent, if encouragement and opportunity are there.
