Ten Win Aquinas Scholarships

Scholarships to Aquinas Institute, valued at over \$9,000, have been awarded to ten area eighth grade students for the 1965-66 academic year, Rev. Leon G. Hart, C.S.B., Aquinas principal, announced this week. The awards were made on the basis of four examinations, including achievement and ability tests and writing qualifications.

The Aquinas grants, applicable for four years, were made to ten students. Four are full tuition and six are partial scholarships, renewable semi-annually, if their credits are maintained.

In making the announcement, Father Hart paid tribute to the excellent caliber of students who competed for the awards. "It is evidence," he said, "of the fine teaching going on in our diocesan elementary schools."

Two of the full-tuition winners hail from the same parish, Paul F. Wendelgass and Laurence D. Behr are class mates at St. James school on Brockley Road. Paul, son of Mr. and Mrs. Francis J. Wendelgass, will find it takes a little more time to reach Aquinas than it did for him to arrive at St. James school. He lives at 240 Brockley Rd., a few doors from his grammar school. Golden Knights Topple Kings

Led by All-America Dick Grubar, the Golden Knights of Schenectady defeated the Bishop Kearney High School hoopers 91 to 55 on Bishop Gibbons' home court. Grubar captured scoring honors for the Knights with 34 points followed by teammate Vern Lannier with 20 points while Pat Shatzel was high man on the Kearney side with 11 points. A Gibbons rebound record was set by Dick Grubar who pulled down 24 rebounds. Since starting in the varsity line-up while in freshman year, Grubar has compiled 1,169 points.

Bishop Kearney battled hard in the first quarter, thanks to the shooting of Pat Shatzel and Bob Case, but trailed 17 to 21 as the buzzer sounded. Gibbons tossed in 20 points to Kearney's 10 points in the second period and the Knights continued in the second half with a deluge of field goals that earned them the highest point total of the year. The Kings did well on the charity stripe with 21 out of 28, matching Gibbons' 75 per cent mark. However, the Kearney cagers could not stifle the torrid attack of the taller and more experience Knights.

Coach Blaha's Knights now have a 12-4 record on the season and are rated high in the sports-minded Albany metropolitan area. Coach Mike Spang and his fine cagers are eagerly awaiting the final game of the season against arch rival Cardinal Mooney next Saturday at the War Memorial. The Kings are then hoping to even off their present 8-9 record.

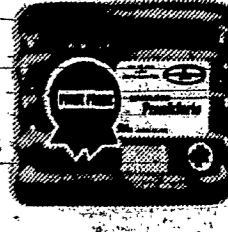
