Fisher Frosh Last Year in High School At John Fisher College

Henry Lockwood of Waverly, a 17-year-old student who is finishing up his last year in high school at St. John Fisher College.

Sound confusing? Well, young Lockwood is an exceptionally good student who completed all his high school courses in three and one-half years and enrolled at Fisher at mid-term this year. The 24 high school credits he had by that time were more than enough—18 are sufficient to graduate.

"Strictly speaking, I could have gone to college after three years, but then I wouldn't have been eligible for a New York Regents diploma. You have to complete four years of English for that," Lockwood explained.

"and I didn't want to be listed as a school 'drop-out,' he added with a grin.

Henry did his high school studies at Notre Dame high school in Elmira. He actually lives in Waverly, where he completed his grammar school (St. James school) and junior high (Waverly high) work.

He was a "commuter" for high school, traveling in to Elmira to attend Notre Dame High until a few weeks ago.

Fisher's newest freshman has not yet decided what specific field he is aiming for, but it will be in some area of science. If he picks engineering, he will leave Fisher after two years to go to an Engineering school. If he decides on chemistry, he'll

major in that in Fisher and then head for graduate school. That path, he thinks, would bring him into some branch of industrial research and application.

Actually, this isn't Lockwood's first experience with college. Last summer, as a special student in the National Science Foundation, he attended summer courses at Northern Illinois University, De Kalb, Ill.

During his slightly-abbreviated high school career, Lockwood racked up a 98% average, and managed to fit in some extra-curricular activities as well.

"That was one special thing I felt in leaving Notre Dame in mid-year," he smiled. "I had an interesting part in our school play, the role of King Henry in 'Becket.' But you can't be in two places at once, so I had to give up the play."

The Waverly boy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Lockwood, has been pleased with the way other Fisher students have accepted him.

"I wouldn't have been surprised to get some real ribbing," he said, "you know, the 'Hey, Kid, why don't you go back and finish up high school?'"

Happily, his reception by the Fisher men has been pleasant and matter-of-fact. What joshing he's received has been strictly good-natured.

Fisher Dean of Men Father Peter Sheehan feels that the Southern Tier product is making a smooth adjustment to college.

"He's in one of my Theology classes, and seems to be perfectly at ease. He's an alert student, one of those who keep a teacher on his toes," was his comment.

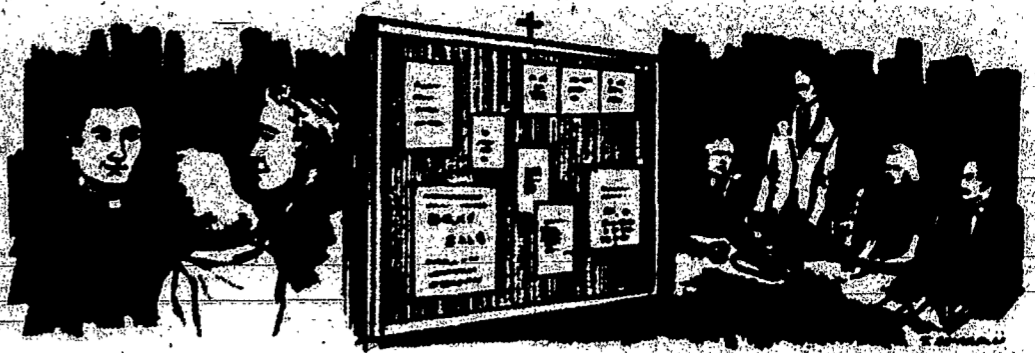

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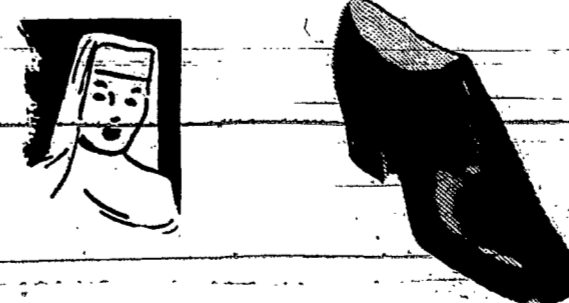
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
