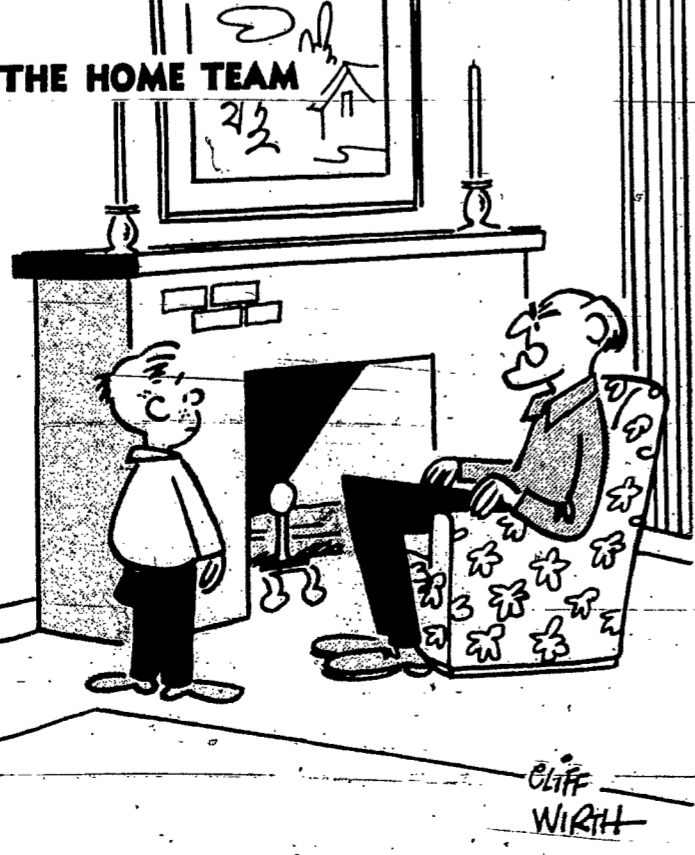
## Spanish Peace Corps
