

More Ritual Revisions

Vatican City — (RNS) — New rituals for the consecration of Mass and the distribution of Holy Communion under the two species of bread and wine will shortly be released for distribution to dioceses around the world, Vatican Radio announced.

It said the rituals had been prepared by the new Commission for the Sacred Liturgy set up by Pope Paul VI under the presidency of Giacomo Cardinal Lercaro, Archbishop of Bologna, Italy. The commission has the responsibility of facilitating and promoting the reforms set forth in the Constitution of the Sacred Liturgy approved by the Second Vatican Council.

Concelebrations, it said, could take place on Holy Thursday, at Masses during ecumenical councils, bishops' conferences and synods, and at the Mass for the blessing of an abbot.

Also, provided permission was granted by the Ordinary of a diocese, concelebration could be done at conventual Mass and at the principal Mass in churches when the needs of the faithful do not require that all the priests available should celebrate individually.

Communion under the single species of bread has been the law in the Latin Rite ever since the Council of Constance in 1415, which decreed that Christ was received entirely under either of the two species of bread and wine.

However, the Constitution on the Liturgy stated that Communion under both species may be permitted when the bishops think fit, not only to clerics but also to the laity, in cases to be determined by the Apostolic See.

Instances, it said, would be Communion to newly-ordained priests at their ordination Mass, or to newly professed religious at the Mass of their religious profession, as well as to the newly baptized during the Mass which follows their baptism and at weddings.

The Vatican station said that also scheduled for early distribution was a pamphlet setting forth variations in the liturgical texts of Holy Week.

These, it said, referred to the Mass accompanying the blessing of the Holy Oils, and some solemn prayers for Good Friday, especially those for the separated brethren, Jews and all those who do not believe in Christ.

U.S. Bishops Establish Unit for Apostolate

Washington — (RNS) — The U.S. Roman Catholic hierarchy has established a Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate here for a continuing re-examination and re-thinking of apostolic methods and to develop a sense of the universal apostolate among Catholics.

With a board of directors comprised of leading prelates, nuns, and lay men and women, the center was recommended by a commission of distinguished religious and lay experts after several years of study.

It also was the result of an idea by Cardinal Cushing of Boston, who will be the center's honorary president. Archbishop John P. Cody of New Orleans, La., is president.

In addition to research, the center will cooperate with organizations engaged in the universal apostolate, promote study in every field that will contribute to the success of the church's spiritual and social mission, foster formation of apostolic workers, and evaluate and communicate new findings.

Lay people on the board of directors include Harry J. O'Haire, executive director of Serra International; Miss Margaret Mealey, executive director of the National Council of Catholic Women; and Martin H. Work, executive director of the National Council of Catholic Men.

Layman of Year Chosen

Nicholas Urzetta, center, of East Rochester, was chosen Catholic Layman of the Year by the Monroe County Catholic War Veterans. County Commander John Falkner presented him the medal indicating the honor at a breakfast following Mass in St. Jerome's Church last Sunday. Judge Emmett Schnepp spoke at the breakfast. Mr. Urzetta, a native of Italy, came to the United States in 1916. He aided in founding East Rochester's Columbus Youth Organization in 1938 and has been long active in civic, religious and athletic events in the community.

Sodalists Are Teaching Religion

Ten boys from McQuaid Jesuit High School are giving up their Saturday mornings to teach Religion to public school children of St. Louis parish, St. Mary Rita, S.S.J., the principal of St. Louis School. Their course deals with the sacraments and the history of the early Church.

Daniel Casaccia, Christopher Scharf and Donald Hoffend are teaching the fifth and sixth grade course, which stresses liturgy, and the Old Testament under the direction of Sister Mary Gabriella, S.S.J. Richard Blum, James Maxwell and James Patterson, and James Martin are instructing third and fourth graders, guided by Sister Charles Marie, S.S.J. This course emphasizes the Ten Commandments and the New Testament.

The boys receive advice and assistance from the Sisters and from the Rev. Mr. Leonard Riformaggio, S.J., their Sodality moderator. They spend approximately two hours preparing for each class. At the weekly Sodality meetings the boys get together with Mr. Riformaggio to discuss their teaching problems.

The students have found their own school religion course at McQuaid a great help, and have been able to explain certain doctrines more fully because of it. The new McQuaid course, written by the Rev. Vincent M. Novak, S.J., takes an entirely different approach to catechism than has been common in more traditional texts, entitled, "Lord of History," it shows how God has intervened in history at various times to guide His plan for man.

At present, the Sisters of St. Joseph are acting as master-teachers, with McQuaid Sodality as student-teachers serving an apprenticeship. Sister Rita hopes the boys will soon be able to take over the classes completely, giving the Sisters a break in their heavy schedule.

As Mr. Riformaggio explains, "Saturday teaching has a twofold effect on the boys. In the first place, they obtain a deeper appreciation of their faith through their efforts to communicate to others. Secondly, they develop a greater awareness of the difficulties involved in teaching, an experience which helps make them better students at McQuaid. In this new age of ecumenism and active lay participation in the affairs of the Church, these young boys are fulfilling their obligations as members of Christ's Mystical Body."

New Directive On Holy Oils

Vatican City — (NC) — Priests no longer have to go to church to get holy oils for sick calls. They can now "keep them in their rooms or in the glove compartments of their cars, ready for all emergencies."

A decree of the Congregation of Rites has allowed local bishops to grant permission in their dioceses for priests to "keep" other than church "places" other than church. The decree was dated March 4 and published on March 18 in L'Osservatore Romano, Vatican City Daily.

It says that priests may carry holy oils with them "especially when they take trips or when circumstances suggest it."

Susanna Story To Be Skipped

Vatican City — (NC) — The Vatican's new Commission on the Liturgy has granted worldwide permission for a substitution for the tradition lesson in the Mass of the Saturday after the third Sunday of Lent, which falls on March 27 this year.

Instead of the long reading from the book of Daniel dealing with slanderous accusations against Susanna, the epistle of the 21st Sunday after Pentecost may be substituted.

The substitute reading is taken from St. Paul's Epistle to the Ephesians. Appropriate to the spirit of Lent, it speaks of the Christian's battle against the wiles of the devil: "You must take up the armor of God, if you are to resist on the evil day, to do your whole duty, and to hold your ground."
