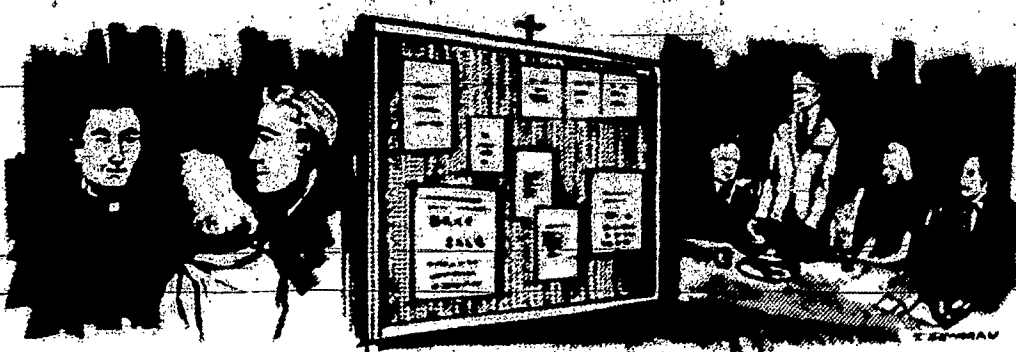

## Harps Club Supporting Irish Memorial to JFK

In support of a National Park in Ireland to be dedicated to the late President of the United States, John F. Kennedy, the Harps Club will sponsor two movies on April 2 and 4 at its clubhouse on Buffalo Road. The movies will be "The Making of a President," and "Ireland: Land and Its People." Both showings begin at 7 p.m.

When President Kennedy visited Ireland in the summer of 1963, he referred to it as "a green and misty island." The name of the park is Arboretum Mountain.

**GOD LOVE YOU**

One wonders if we heed sufficiently the human nature of Christ. It was, indeed, the Temple of God, for Divinity dwelt in Him enfleshed. If you put an electric light bulb in an alabaster vase, the vase glows and becomes incandescent. Why then should not Christ's humanity have had the same iridescent beauty? It did on the Mount of Transfiguration and it probably would have at all other times if He had not prevented it. But, more important still, this human nature He took was related to every person who would ever live. We were in Him—our flesh and blood; for the human race both before Him and after Him was concentrated in that human Ark of the Covenant. He was the representative of every man; every African, every Asiatic, every Communist, every Christian.

We know we are all in Adam. We need only to look at the effect of his sin in us: our distorted appetites, our darkened minds, our weak wills, our battle to preserve ideals against the world of the flesh and the devil. Now if Adam has this effect on humanity, shall Christ have less? Does He not surround all of us, more than radar waves floating in the air. Though few are turned in to them, the music and the speech are still there, as the merits of Christ's cross are available to us if we but "tune in."

During Lent as the Church concentrates on the Humanity of Christ, you faithful identify yourselves with the Passion and Cross by your fasting and sacrifices. Why not make this "tuning in" complete by identifying yourselves with Christ as He suffers today in the poor, the sick, the homeless of the world?
