Elmira, Rochester, Penfield Teams Capture CYO Basketball Crowns

St. Patrick's of Elmira did it at the end. Sacred Heart of Rochester did it at the beginning, and St. Joseph's of Penfield picked a spot about halfway between the other two but they all wound up as CYO champions last Sunday at the conclusion of the 14th Annual CYO Diocesan Parish Basketball Tournament.

St. Patrick's trailed by a point going into the final minute of its HIGH SCHOOL DIVISION title game against Blessed Sacrament, but showed a good clutch hand and came through with a 61-56 win and its second straight championship. For the first time since 1950, the victory climaxed a 150 season and gave them a second leg on the Bishop Kearney Trophy. If they can come up with a third title next year, they'll be the first squad to retire the trophy.

The late foul shooting of Mike Appin and 22 points by Murray were the big items for the Elmiraans, who saw Blessed Sacrament's second-half rush. Bob Wynne's 20 points and Dick Webster's 12 were the top efforts for the losers. Baskets by that pair had twice given B.S. one-point leads in the late going before Appin did his damage at the foul line.

There were no last-minute dramas in Sacred Heart's 77-38 win over St. John's of Greece for the GRAMMAR SCHOOL "WHITE" CHAMPIONSHIP. Pucky McFarland's Sacred Heart crew blitzed their foe early and held an overwhelming 36-14 lead at the half. Tom Meek's 31 points and 21 by Doug Farrell led the way. Meagher's 23 points were outstanding for St. John's in a losing cause.

The victory, number 60 in the three year string that Sacred Heart has compiled, earned the locals their second successive White title and their third in five years.

While both defending champions were attending to their laurels, an unheralded St. Joseph's team took its first championship home to Penfield with a surprisingly one-sided 53-35 victory over St. Jerome's of East Rochester in the GRAMMAR SCHOOL "GREEN" finale.

St. Jerome's held a 3-point win over St. Joseph's in the regular season and fashioned a 13-9 lead after one quarter on Sunday. With Mike Baynes hitting consistently, the ER squad held that edge until late in the second period when lanky Nick Combs hit for a pair of baskets and handed off to Greg Moss for another as St. Joseph's grabbed a 21-19 halftime lead.

After a Baynes set shot tied the count early in the second half, St. Joseph's suddenly mounted a run of 18 straight points to settle the issue. Combs and Moss were again the leaders, the big center doing most of the scoring and the latter handling the playmaking.

Combs poured in a tournament high of 33 points, giving him 80 for his 3 appearances and making him the tournament MVP.

In another excellently-staged program, 10 champions, six of them defending titlists, were crowned Saturday night in the 28th annual Aquinas Mission Bouts at the Aquinas Auditorium.
